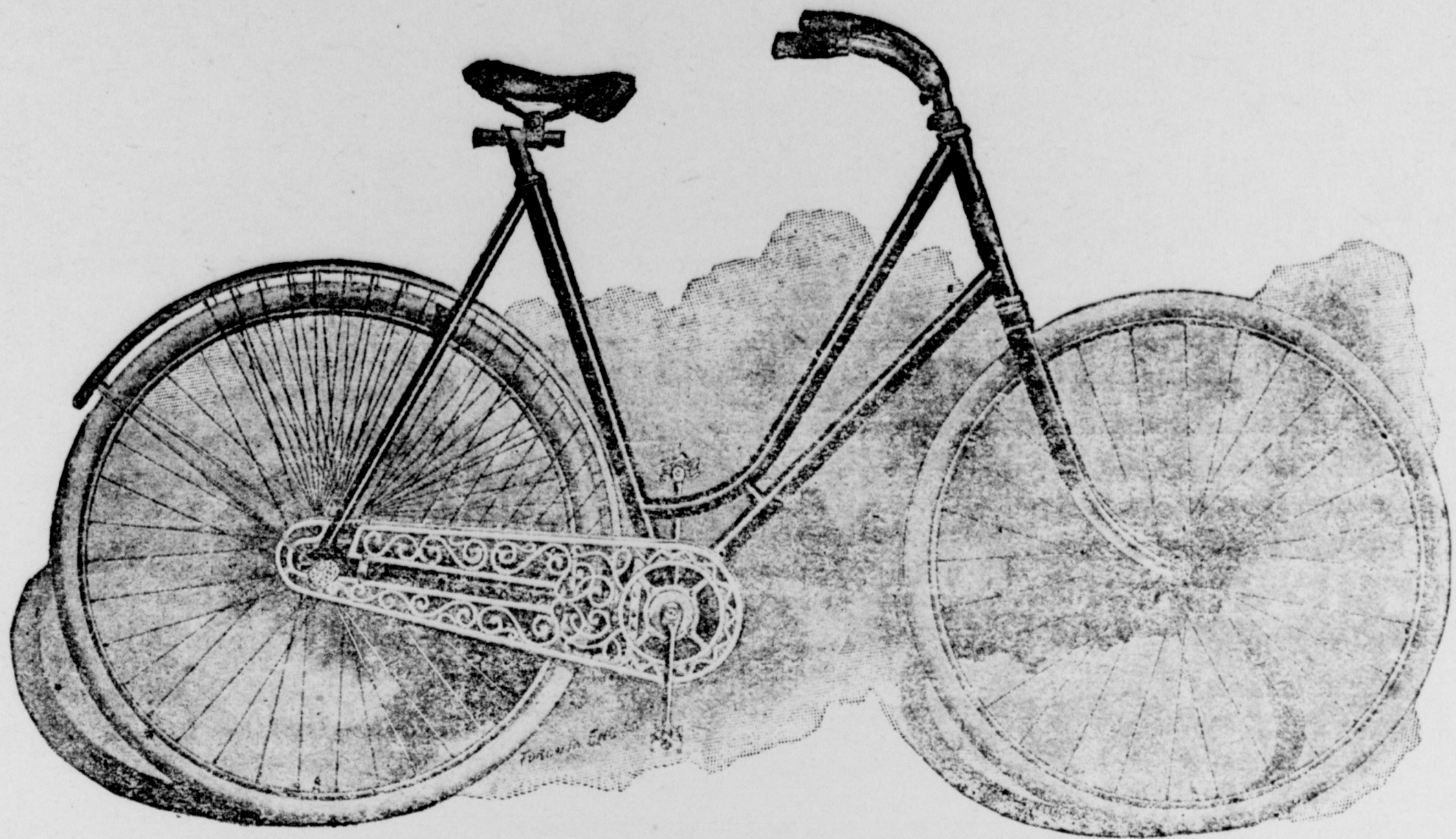
Farmers say that there is an excellent prospect of a good hay crop. The clover is coming better than for some years. The timothy also is looking prosperous.
