The County Council has spoken and the goal goes to Woodstock. A new building is to be built to cost in the vicinity of \$10,000. Woodstock Town was sharp when it schemed to get the strange legislation that gave it the boon of having a new county gaol built within its precincts. It knew that if repairs were put on the old building a new one was only a question of a few years, and then it would be built in the most central town in the county—which is the right and proper place for it. This goal business is a piece of long headed scheming. However it is a good thing for Woodstock that the gaol is to be built there. The town needs propagation, for when a place of its size has half a hundred empty houses within its bounds there certainly must be a decadence going on. Seeing it has the gaol maybe Woodstock will be considerate enough of Hartland to cease working against its Bridge project.

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For the present the St. John pork packing establishment scheme is hung up for lack of capitol, chiefly occasioned by the opposition of local packers who claim the farmers won't supply hogs enough. This is not true; the farmers will supply any demand for hogs that may be made.

Postal Notes.

The postal note system has been inaugurated throughout Canada. The postal notes are in sixteen denominations, ranging from 20 cents to \$5. The Government's commission upon notes up to 50 cents is 1 cent; from 50 cents to \$2.50 the commission is 2 cts.; and from \$2.50 up to \$5.00, 3 cents commission is charged. These postal notes will be issued at and payable at any post office money order office throughout Canada. They must be cashed within three months of the date of their issue.

It is a most convenient method of transferring money. All that a person who wishes to send money to another person has to do is to go to the post office, purchase a note of the required denomination (odd cents are made up by affixing postage stamps), enclose it in a letter and send it to the payee.

Grand Falls.

There is no doubt now but what Grand Falls has struck a genuine boon. Work on the water power development has actually commenced. A large number of men will be employed for digging the canal and for excavating for the large building which will be constructed. Nearly a mile of railway will be built to connect with the C. P. R. Between two and three hundred dollars will be spent and the works will be hastily put through to completion. The chief men of the enterprise are: Sir Wm. Van Horn, Senator Proctor of Vermont and Gen. Alger the United States Secretary of War.

The Newburg Picnic.

Having rained on Tuesday Father Bradley's picnic at Newburgh Junction was postponed until Wednesday, which was a beautiful day. There was a good attendance and financial success must have followed. Everyone seemed to enjoy themselves to the full. Various amusements and refreshments were indulged in, and the best of order was strictly maintained. The Toronto Exhibition.

The Toronto Exhibition will be held this year from August 29 to September 10.
