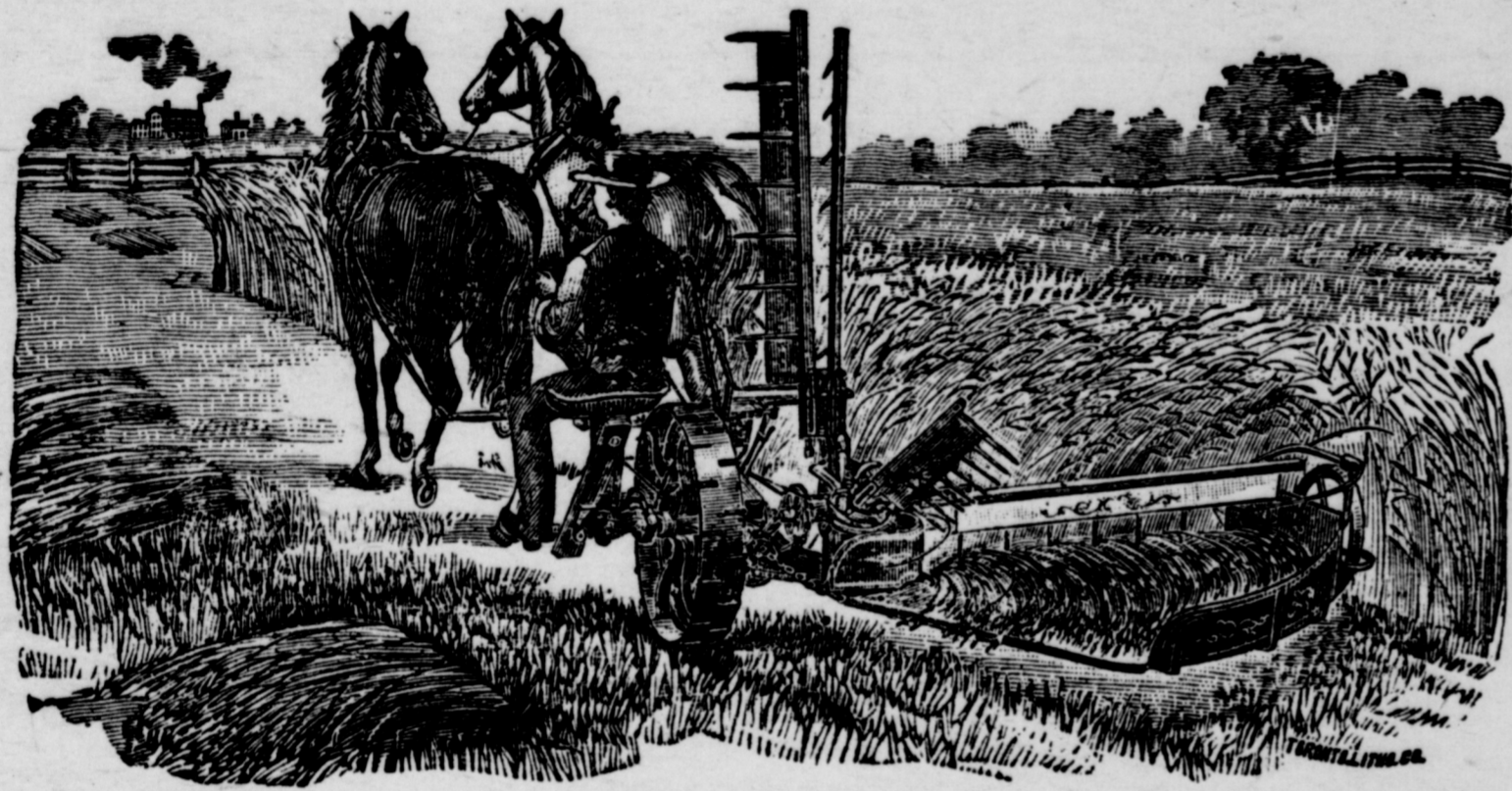

It is an interesting fact that the earliest Canadian apples on this market are the fruit of New Brunswick orchards. In the last three weeks A. L. Godwin has handled 600 barrels of apples of the well known New Brunswick variety, from orchards near Woodstock. These apples mature early and of course find a ready sale.—Sun.

Robert F. Rose has the distinction of having performed more important public shorthand work than any other member of his profession in this country. One of his most notable achievements was the report of the Berry investigation of the Chicago police force. In nine days Mr. Rose and his assistants filled 2,800 typewritten pages, making in all 840,000 words. Twenty copies of this testimony were made for the committee, newspapers, and others interested, making an aggregate of 16,800,000 words written by the typewriters. The whole report set in nonpareil type would fill 10,000 columns of an ordinary newspaper. Mr. Rose is president and instructor of the Robert F.
