### Distressing Occurrence at Highlands.

A most lamentable and distressing cas-  
ualty, occurred near Highlands N. B.  
on Saturday 20th. inst., by which two  
children, Mrs. Fisher, the wife of  
Harvey Fisher, (who was from non-  
the lumber woods) left the house to go  
the barn, for the purpose of feeding and  
watering the cattle, about eleven o'clock  
in the forenoon; leaving their two chil-  
dren; aged respectively; three years, and  
eleven months; in the house. After a very  
short absence she returned, and was hor-  
ror stricken to find the house enveloped  
in flames, so that it was impos-ible to  
enter it and attempt to rescue the hap-  
less victims, who were sacrificed in the  
ruined home. The Coroner, Dr. Welch,  
having been notified, held an inquest on  
the charred remains of the unfortunate  
victims of this dreadful calamity. The  
evidence was of an entirely negative de-  
scription, as no clue could be obtained to  
account for the outbreak of fire. The jury  
after due deliberation; and a careful con-  
sideration of all the facts obtainable,  
returned a verdict to the effect:—That  
the two children of Harvey Fisher, met  
with their death, through the accidental  
burning of the dwelling house.

The bodies of the two ill-fated children  
were burnt past all recognition, and but  
for the prompt action of some of the  
neighbours, would have been completely  
destroyed in a short time.

### Serious Assault at Highlands.

On Friday 19th. inst., a serious assault  
was perpetrated on Robert Lunnie, of  
Highlands, we have only heard one side  
of the case, at present; which may be all

information laid before the magistrates  
is correct; on the day named; one W. G.  
McFarland, also of Highlands, drew from  
his pocket a revolver, with he threaten'd  
to shoot Jacob Lunnie. He then made  
a blow at Robert Lunnie with an axe,  
which he warded off, but a second blow  
landed home on Lunnie's nose, severely  
damaging that organ, necessitating sur-
