

**Well Done Gillmor.**

Mr. E. S. Gillmor has at length come out of his shell and shown that he really is in earnest in his parliamentary aspirations. His address to the electors which appeared in last week's *Sentinel* is rather voluminous, and deals with the pecuniary aspect of elections,—what might be called a Profit and Loss account;—The bribery and corruption that, according to Mr. G. usually characterises political contests; comes in for some very scathing remarks, one would infer that the candidate who would issue such a manifesto must be, like Caesar's wife, "Above suspicion." Some years ago we heard a Glassville politician say: "Professional politicians are privileged liars." Mr. G's address would lead us to infer that they are privileged thieves also.
