Resignation of H. A. Connell, Esq.

PROGRESS.

It is with great satisfaction that we note the great progress that has been made in this part of the province, in the past few years. There is scarcely a part of the country round about us but what bears distinct evidence of that progress. Better markets have been opened up for our produce, the circulating medium is more easily obtainable than it was, only a few short short years ago. Our farms are in better shape, our crops are greater year by year, the area of cleared land is constantly on the increase. The farm buildings of our yeomen are better and more commodious, the dwelling houses have been improved, and are now more pretentious in appearance as well as better supplied with modern conveniences, and a general air of progress and prosperity seems to pervade our community. Nowhere is the march of progress more markedly visible than in our little city itself, fine handsome stores have sprung up, new houses have been built, and old ones renovated, so that it has now quite an imposing appearance. Industries are springing up around us, and the means of procuring goods are becoming easier. Only a short time since, everything in the way of horse finish had to be procured from a distant town; with excessive

rates of freight to pay, now within a few miles there are two wood-working factories, capable of turning out unlimited quantities of excellent work. We lately made a visit of inspection to one of these, that of Britain and Carter, at Bristol. to find such an amount of elaborate and intricate machinery as was then in running order, all put in motion by a steam engine of the most approved construction. We cordially wish every success to the spirited young men, who have embarked in such a necessary and useful business.

It may perhaps savour of egotism, if we mention amongst the most prominent marks of our social progress; the fact that we have in our little city, "A Little Newspaper." It is small, of course, but, what great paper is there to-day, that did not rise from as humble origin as our own little sheet? We have now entered on the second year of it's existence, and know with some satisfaction, that it is appreciated and welcomed, by all our patrons. "Eh, Bellie, dae ye no ken about Paul and you at the Sunday Schule. It was him that pu'd Daniel out the lion's den."

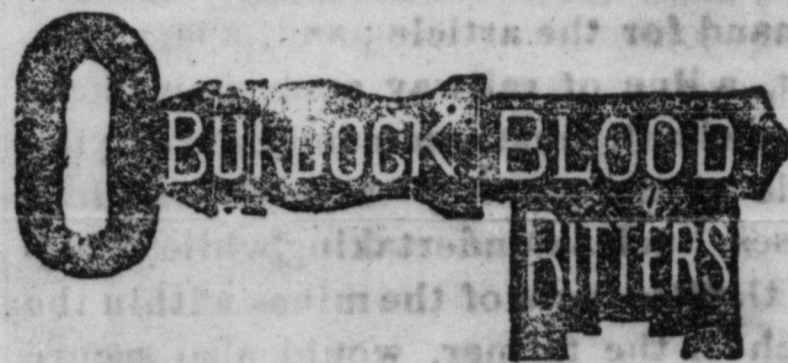
