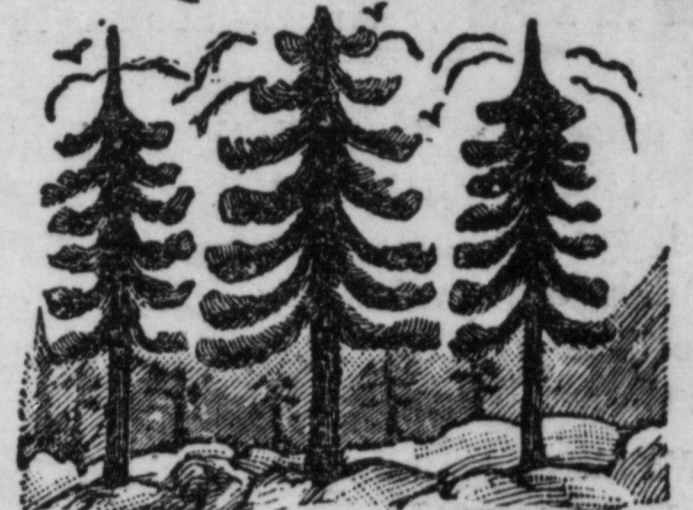

**OUR PARISH ELECTION.**—We are somewhat late in publishing this number,
