The year that has just closed has been a remarkable one in many respects, and has been full of exciting events

In the far east two nations have been engaged in a sanguinary war, with most disastrous results to one of them. A comparatively young, and a small nation has beaten a large and populous empire, and humbled her to the dust. The outcome of this war has not been realized as yet, European countries have anxiously waited for the spoils of the threatened dismemberment of the vanquished; and, Diplomats are carefully watching the hands of each other to prevent cheating at this game of Grab. It is impossible to see what may be the result of this little game, but it is certain that a cloud hangs over the east that may, at no distant date, burst into a storm of war between two or more European nations.
