THE IRISH AGITATION.

The small attendance at the weekly meeting of the Cork Land League has caused much comment. It is attributed to the fact that the Land Act has afforded the farmers much satisfaction. In Tyrone County, Mr. Rylatt, the Home Rule candidate for Parliament, has espoused the cause of the laborers, who will support him.

At the banquet given to Mr. Dillon in Dublin on Monday, he said he was very strongly of the opinion that the passage of the Land Bill would immensely increase the difficulty if not render impossible the carrying out of the Land League movement on the old lines. He feared the yoke of landlord ascendancy would be so much altered as to make the people once more bow their heads beneath it, whereas if the fight had been continued another six months unconditionally they would have been in a position to dictate their own terms and abolish landlordism altogether. The majority of the League Executive body seemed to favor trying the Bill. Dillon believed at this stage the League could not prevent the people from trying the Bill, but he could not support the League policy of trying the Bill, and under the circumstances he would retire from public life a few months and leave those who believed in this policy to carry it out unembarrassed. Dillon said he was unprepared to acquiesce in it, and as he was unable to consistently co-operate therein, he felt it his duty to stand aside for the present.

While a number of tenants on Sir George Colthurst's property, near Mill-street, Cork, were rejoicing on Sunday over the marriage of their landlord, an armed and disguised party of nearly 100 surrounded the tenants and fired into them, wounding ten. Two are in a precarious condition. No arrests.

NEW FEATURES FROM AUSTRALIA.

(From the San Francisco Daily Examiner) COLE'S CIRCUS.—The pavilion at the corner of Seventh and Market streets was filled to the limit of its seating capacity last night to witness the initial performance of this mammoth show.

The menagerie has been considerably enlarged since it left here on its tour around the world, by the addition of some of the wonderful birds and animals of the antipodes, and includes a white buffalo from India, the Maori war dances, Arabian athletes, kangaroos, ostriches, and other Australian curiosities. The grand entrance with its camels, elephants, ladies, knights in armor, and electric light shining on the spangles and the brilliant accoutrements, was a sight

which brought forth applause from the audience. The wonderful performance which George Conkling puts his trained elephants through, was well done. The act consisting of running a bicycle on a wire suspending across the dome of the circus, caused a thrill to run through the spectators, and was performed by John Muritz, George Dunbar and Adelaide d'Attalie. The batouette leaping by the corps of athletes showed to what perfection human muscle can be brought by training, several of the members doing a double somersault in masterly style. William Organ then introduced his trick horses Humboldt and Hindoo, the former doing some wonderful jumping. The equestrian acts of Wooda Cook and Mlle Adelades were well executed. It is a notable fact that none but bare-back riders are engaged, and these are champions of their calling. W. O'Dale Stevens, with his dancing globes and electric table seemed to meet with the approbation of the audience. Miss Linka Jeal did a daring bare back hurdle, act leaping with her horse Salamander through great circles of fire. The troupe of six trained stallions made their bow to the audience next, and were put through their part of the performance by William Organ, which includes waltzing on their legs, setting down on chairs and other difficult and ingenious tricks. Taken altogether, the circus is the most meritorious one that has been here for a good many years. The acrobats and riders are excellent, the animals well trained and the clowns have picked up some new jokes during their travels in foreign lands. 1. The lands in certain parishes on the Red and Assiniboine Rivers, then remaining undisposed of. The upset price to be \$5 per acre.

2. The lands then remaining the property of the Government in the Menomonie Reservation, situated in townships 1, 2 and 3, ranges 1 to 5 west, both inclusive, and in township 1, range 1 east in the Province of Manitoba, at the upset price of \$3 per acre.
