likely to embarrass than to aid the Government in the House at this critical moment, so that it is not at all probable that this singular act of clemency has been exercised in order to obtain his aid and influence in support of the expected opposition to the Lord's amendments when the Bill returns to the commons. It is much more probable that the release is the first of a series which will now take place, and doubtless in a few weeks all the prominent suspects who have been imprisoned on charges analogous to these brought against Mr. Dillon will again be at liberty. The release of the member for Tipperary must necessarily exercise an important influence on the action of the Land League. He was always its most extreme and impulsive leader, and doubtless he will once more take a controlling place in the councils of the organization. No one imagines for a moment that he has during his enforced retirement changed his views with regard to the necessity of carrying on the agitation with, if possible, increased vigour, and in the approaching convention all his influence and power will be exerted to throw new life and power into the conflict. There are those who insinuate that Mr Dillon has been set at liberty in order to rally his forces and

CREMATING A QUEEN.

The United States consul at Bangkok reports to the State Department under date of March 25th, that the ceremonies incident to the cremation of the late queen and infant child have just terminated after a duration of eleven days. It will be remembered that these royal personages were accidentally drowned in the Menam River on May 31st, 1880. For the two weeks past Bangkok has been thronged with visitors from all parts of the kingdom, during which time the heat had been intense, the small-pox appalling and the dust barely endurable. The preparations for the ceremonies have been more elaborate and expensive than any ever before known in Siam, costing, it is said, \$500,000 or more. The exercises consisted of religious rites after the Buddhist faith, processions, races, tournaments, tilting, boxing, wrestling, theatrical performances, games, fireworks &c. Each day the fire distributed as gifts among the assembled thousands large numbers of small Siamese gold and silver coins and lottery tickets encased in limes and wooden bells, which were eagerly struggled for alike by rich and poor, bond and free, peer and peasant. On the 13th inst. the remains of the late Queen and Princess were borne in catafalque and procession with great pomp and ceremony from their temporary resting place in the palace to the pramane or cremation building, where they were placed under the funeral pile. On the 19 inst. the King applied the torch and lighted pyre amid the lamentations of wailing women, children and priests. His Majesty was visibly affected, and gave expression to his great sorrow. On the following day the ashes were collected and consigned to the Manam river. The unconsumed bone relics were incensed in golden vessels and deposited with those of the royal family. The diplomatic and consular corps had been specially invited by the King to witness these ceremonies, and throughout the same, attended by the Foreign Minister, they occupied choice positions for comfort and observation.

LORD DUFFERIN AND THE SERPENT COLUMN.

[Constantinople Correspondence London Times.]

For the moment, the incident which provokes most curiosity and speculation in the Turkish official world is the expected arrival of Lord Dufferin. What attitude, it is asked, will he adopt toward the Sultan and the Porte? Will he show himself, like Mr Goschen, cold, hard, reserved, severe and stoically insensible to imperial blandishments, or will he display that genial cordiality which has gained for him golden opinions in other spheres of activity? While some official personages were discussing this subject the other day at the Porte they expectedly received from the International Telegraph Department a copy of a telegram bearing Lord Dufferin's signature and addressed to Mr. Plunkert, who is acting as Charged Affairs. Such telegrams are generally sent in cipher, but the present one was an exception to the rule and was carefully

at the approaching convention, thus creating a schism in the land league ranks which, in the present temper of the country, would be a grave disaster to the country. Whatever cause may be assigned for the step Mr. Dillon will not keep the country long in suspense regarding his intentions. Whatever he considers best to be done he will say or do at once. He will find the conditions of the Irish problem very much changed, and on this altered aspect he will have to set his mind seriously at work. It is not too much to say that on the course which Mr. Dillon may adopt within the next few days will depend the future welfare of the land agitation. The news of the release of the prisoner caused universal rejoicing.

The Herald correspondent saw Mr. Dillon today. While ready to speak on personal matters he did not wish to say anything of a political nature. Mr. Dillon stated that he got on well for the first two months, but in the last two months his health had given away, and caused great uneasiness to his friends. Dr. Kennay and the prison physician both recommended his discharge a week ago; but on Saturday Mr Dillon was informed that the first three months of his confinement had expired and that his term had been extended for three months longer.
