He abolished the old logy way of doing things; broke up the rings, and secured value to the settlers for every dollar laid out. Some of those who were watching, ready to pounce upon him if he did not visit the settlements, began to ridicule him when he did-but the public, and the legislature saw his course, and approved of it. Some then said, his duties yet are only a novelty; he will not visit the settlements any more. But they are sorely deceived and disappointed. This is now his third year in office, and he is now making his third visitation. He is doing now as he did last year, as he did his first year. He is giving the settlements his personal attention; and is for himself seeing what the settlers require and upon the spot making the appropriations. The people appreciate his efforts, their praise is unbounded; for he is doing what was never done by any Surveyor General before.
