



A GARTER FOR SIR JOHN.

It is said Sir John Macdona'd is to be invested with the order of the Garter while in England. While less worthy and brilliant statesmen have received this distinguished honor, it is not likely the rumor will prove correct. The British Government is very conservative in the disposal of garters, and we do not think they would easily consent to see one go to a Colonial Minister, however distinguished, or however worthy. After Beaconsfield had become Prime Minister of England, he did not think he had reached the top of the ladder til he got a garter. But it was not till after his return from the Berlin Cougress, bearing the laurel "peace with honor," till he had received the Freedom of London, and till the people a far more sweeping measure. looked at him much as the Romans did on Cæsar after his famous return, that the desire of his heart was gra the garter. origin of this order, since the question has come up.
