

Disaster To The Manitoban

This fine ship, of the Allan line, has been badly wrecked by running against a cliff in the Strait of Belle Isle. It was on Tuesday a week from yesterday. A cold easterly wind had sprung up, with its usual accompaniments in the Strait of Belle Isle, of dense midst and obscuring fog. Several small icebergs had been passed. A careful lookout was including Hair, Cloth Nail Hand Tooth and kept both forward on the halyard deck and on the bridge. Shortly before noon the forward watch cried out, " Land ahead." The officer in charge immediately telegraphed to the engine depart-

ment to have the engines reversed at full speed.
