Chatham, N. B. IMMENSE TIDAL WAVES.

Where the tide moves in all at once from the ocean, the phenomenon is called an eagre or bore. According to Dana the most perfect examples are found at the mouths of the rivers Amog zon, Hoogly, (one of the mouths of the Ganges) and Tsientang,in joying a high reputation for China. In the case of the lastmentioned river the wave plunges on like an advancing cataract, four or five miles in breadth and thirty feet high, and thus passes up the stream, to a distance of eighty miles, at a rate of twenty-five miles an hour. The change from ebb to flood tide is almost instantaneous. Among the Chusan islands, just south of the bay, the tidal currents run through the funnelshaped frith with a velocity of sixteen miles an hour.
