MICHAEL DAVITT.

Davitt, the founder of the Land League is a native of the County Mayo, Ireland, where he was born in the terrible famine year of 1846.

He is the son of a tenant farmer, who occupied a holding near what was once the village of Satride. In the general clearance made by the landlords after the famine year, Davitt was ejected with hundreds of others, and with his family came to the United States and located in Pennsylvania, but they afterward came to England, taking Michael, who was then but a mere lad, and settled in Rochdale where young Davitt grew up.

On a charge of having furnished arms to Fenians, Davitt was arrested in 1867, and sentenced to fifteen years penal servitude, spending about seven years of the term in prison in England.

He was at length released on a ticket of leave, set at liberty, and paid a visit to the United States. On his return from the second visit, last November he landed in Ireland, which fact led to his arrest. The news of the arrest of Davitt spread through the provinces with amazing rapidity, and many indignation meetings have already been held.

The accounts of the arrest say that Davitt was arrested by a detective from London while crossing Carlisle Bridge, Dublin, for not reporting himself to the police, and was immediately driven to Kingston where he was placed on the steamer for London. The Doctor advised the prisoner to go to hospital as soon as he arrived, as he was liable to an attack of the lungs. Egan and Brennan subsequently obtained an interview with Davitt. He was in good spirits, and he expects to go before a magistrate, and thence be conveyed to the convict prison at Dartmoor.

Speaking of Davitt's imprisonment a correspondent says Mr Davitt was consigned to the Millbank prison on the bank of the Thames, about half a mile below the Houses of Parliament. The steamer arrived at Holyhead about an hour before midnight. Mr Davitt was in charge of detectives who went over from Scotland Yard to make the arrest, and accompanying them were six detectives from Dublin. On the arrival of the steamer the party took a special train for London. Detachments of police guarded all the stations on the route, and a pilot engine ran ten minutes ahead of the train to secure it an uninterrupted transit. The train arrived at Euston Square Station at 6.45 and Mr

Davitt was at once conducted to Bow Street Station where the Magistrate, Sir James Ingham, was sitting in pursuance of a previous arrangement, and who heard the case privately at that unnaturally early hour for any kind of court proceeding. These occupied but a short time. Mr Davitt, when arraigned, asked the Magistrate why his ticket of leave had been revoked, and was informed that it was no question for the Magistrate to answer. Sir James Ingham then signed the document committing Davitt to prison, to which he was immediately driven in a common police van or "Black Maria." At the hour when the court is usually opened great crowds assembled, and were chagrined to find the proceedings ended and nothing to be seen. The sympathizers with Davitt expressed themselves angrily at the arrest, and particularly at this summary of disposing of his person.

Millbank Prison, in which Davitt is confined, is a gloomy fortress-like structure, surrounded by high walls. Here or elsewhere he will have to languish for seven years longer, unless released by the present or some subsequent administration. The prison is extra guarded to forestall attempts at rescue. Mr Shaw is reported as saying he is afraid Davitt will never come out of prison alive.

EXPULSION OF THE HOME RULERS.

In the House of Commons on Thursday evening, Sir William Harcourt, replying to Mr. Parnell, said Davitt was arrested because his actions were considered incompatible with his ticket-of-leave. Thereupon Mr. Parnell asked what conditions Davitt had violated. There was no answer to this question. The Irish members shouted "shame," and the other members cheered tremendously. The scene surpassed all description. The Speaker called upon Mr. Gladstone to move his resolution, whereupon Mr. Dillon rose, but the Speaker refused to hear him. After repeated warnings, the Speaker "named" Dillon, and Mr. Gladstone moved his suspension, amidst enthusiastic cheers and cries of "order," the Irish members shouting "shame." The motion for the suspension of Mr. Dillon was adopted by 395 to 33. Mr. Dillon refused to withdraw from the House, and was forcibly removed by the sergeant-at-arms, by order of the Speaker, amidst cries of "shame" by the Irish members.

Mr. Gladstone, in replying to Mr. Cowen (Radical), said it was due to the House and to the Speaker, that his (Gladstone's) action on Wednesday should be discussed as early as possible, but the House cannot give a motion on the subject priority over the obstruction resolutions or Protection Bill. The remarks of the Premier were greeted with loud cheers. Mr. Sullivan withdrew the motion relative to the Speaker, saying he refused to be party to a farce. Mr. Sullivan protested against Mr. Dillon's forcible removal as an act of violence and illegality. The Speaker pointed out the fact that Mr. Dillon had defied the Chair. Mr. Gladstone now rose to address the House, and Mr. O'Donohue (Liberal) also rose to move the adjournment. The Speaker at once ruled that Mr. Gladstone was in possession of the floor. Thereupon Mr. Parnell moved that Mr. Gladstone be no longer heard. The Speaker declared Mr. Parnell was defying the Chair, and upon his persisting the Speaker declared he was wilfully obstructing the proceedings and warned him. Mr. Parnell's suspension was then moved, but upon the Speaker making an order for the House to be cleared for a division all the Home Rulers refused to leave the House. The motion to suspend Mr. Parnell was ul-
