THE GRIM OLD TOWER OF LONDON.

Although the tower has been so frequently described, a brief glance even at this moment may reveal a few features which have hitherto been overlooked. Everybody is acquainted with that cruel Prince, but splendid soldier, so woefully maligned by Shakespeare in his tragedy of Richard the Third. The wall of this tower is, in thickness, thirty feet, and the gateway was formerly defended by two portcullises, one of which, five hundred years old, can still be lowered at a moment's notice.
