THE BISHOPS' MANIFESTO. The declaration of the Catholic hierarchy on the Land Bill was published Thursday. They recognize in the bill an honest and statesman-like purpose of placing on a solid and equitable basis the relations of landlord and tenant in Ireland. But to effect a permanent and satisfactory settlement of the land question they recommend eighteen alterations in the bill.
