

the Land Bill. Parnell was the chief STOVES! speaker. He disapproved of the first portion of the Bill which was generally obscure, but partially prejudicial to the tenant. There were 32,000 holdings under eight pounds, and 750,000 under four pounds, many of the tenants being in a bankrupt condition; and as far as it regarded these, the Bill did not secure free sale, and only increased the power of landlords to enforce rack-renting. Another important defect related to these small tenants who had been compelled of these benefits which the Land Act of 1870 conferred on them. There were thousands of these leases which were of such a character as to make it impossible for tenants to satisfy the clauses of the Bill pertaining thereto. Diloln and others spoke, and a resolution passed declaring the bill inadequate.
