**Rev. Neil McKay Dead.**

CHATHAM, June 15.—Rev. Neil McKay, formerly pastor of St. David's church, St. John, died this morning of heart disease.

Rev. Neil McKay was one of the leading divines of the Presbyterian church in this province. He was between 65 and 70 years of age, and was a native of Earlston, Colchester county, N. S. When a young man he taught school, and on the 19th of September, 1855 was ordained to the ministry and entered on his labors at Murray Harbor, N. S. In 1861 he for some time supplied the pulpit of St. David's church, and on the 14th of May, 1862, the Presbytery sustained his call to the pastorate and he was inducted on the 29th of the same month. After 11 years of service during which he did excellent work, he was, in February, 1873, called to Summerside, P. E. Island. He preached his farewell sermon in St. David's on Feb. 22, 1873. He remained at Summerside until Sept. 30, 1885, when he entered on his last charge at St. John's church, Chatham. At the convocation at Pine Hill College, Halifax, in 1896, the honorary degree of D. D. was conferred upon Rev. Mr. McKay for his valuable services to the church during a period of forty years. Rev. Mr. McKay when in this city was clerk of the St. John Presbytery from 1867 to 1872, and was elected clerk of the Miramichi Presbytery shortly after going to Chatham, and continued to hold the position at the time of his death. Wherever stationed Rev. Mr. McKay gained the good will and esteem not only of his own congregation and people, but of all in the community. No man stood higher in the counsels of the church, for he was strictly conscientious in his attendance at the church courts, never missing a meeting except through illness. He took a prominent part in all public discussions, and on the committees was a most valuable worker and was recognized as a vigorous fighter for what he considered right but most willing to shake hands and forget when the battle was over or when shown to be wrong. He was a good preacher, and the Chatham church will find it difficult to get such another minister. Mrs. McKay, formerly Miss McKnight, of Halifax, died about a year ago. Two sons and two daughters survive.

What a Dinner Costs.  
 Recently a gentleman who is fond of arithmetic made up his mind that he would find out how much a dinner really costs. This gentleman ascertained how much a simple dinner (that he was eating) cost, and he was told 75 cents.

He contradicted this and then made out the following statement about the cost of that dinner: The pepper, he said, came from 10,000 miles away. It grew on a little bush about 8 feet high, which must have had a growth of at least five years. The pepper was picked green. It had to be dried in the sun, and this meant employing women. It took one ship and 1,000 miles of railroad to bring the pepper to the United States. The flour of which the bread was made came from Dakota. Some one owned the land and that meant the investing of capital, and then he had also to pay wages to workingmen. The flour had to be ground, and the building of the mill and the plant or machinery meant more money invested. The millers had to be paid, coopers had to be paid for making the barrels and, of course, the wood of which the barrels were made had to be cut and sawed and shaped, and this meant the employing of more men. Then the flour had to be shipped over the railroad and handled again by cartmen before it came into the house.

The tea on the table came from China and the coffee from South America. The codfish had to be brought from Maine. Men had to be employed to catch the fish. Other men and women were employed in drying, packing and boxing it and it, too, had to make a long railroad journey.

The salt came from the Indian reservation in the northwestern part of the New York state. The spices in the cake came from the Spice islands in the Indian archipelago. The canned peaches came from California, and they, too, represented the employment of capital and labor. The little dinner represented, directly or indirectly, the employment of \$500,000, 000 of capital and 5,000,000 men.—Chicago News.

Soaking Small Seeds.  
 Prof. Waugh, of Vermont, has been experimenting with soaking small seeds in a solution of pepsin or diastase to increase their germinating or feeding power. Prof. Waugh writes to Rural New Yorker that diastase has proved much better than pepsin for this purpose. He says: "We dissolve one part of powdered malt in ten parts of water, strain it and put the seeds in soak for 24 hours. A quart of malt, worth 5 cents or less, would thus make ten quarts of liquid, or enough to treat ten pounds of tomato or radish seeds or peas."

As explained in the journal mentioned, "this idea embodies much the same principle as that made use of by humans who chew pepsin gum or other substances to promote digestion. The soaking of the seed makes the starchy matter more available as food for the little germ and thus starts an earlier and more vigorous growth. This plan may not be entirely practicable yet, but there is something in it, and an investigating farmer may well try it in a small way."
