PRICE OF FLOUR GOES DOWN.—The price of flour has taken a noticeable drop during the past week, consequent upon the break in the Chicago wheat market. Manitoba patents such as Hungarian and Five Roses, have dropped \$1.15 and are now selling at retail at \$6.50. Ontario patents have fallen \$1.00 and Goldie's Star and Peoples are retailing to-day at \$5.75.

FIRST OF THE SEASON.—The steamer Hampstead brought down river yesterday a box of wild strawberries, the first of the season. They were a present to a friend in the city and were sent by three little maids of Wickham, Queens county, Aggie, Lottie and Dora Gerow. They stated in a note accompanying the fruit that they had picked a pint of the tempting fruit on Friday, the 10th inst. This is said to be the earliest appearance of wild strawberries for years.—Sun, Friday.

NEW DEPOT.—The Canadian Eastern Railway Company are making preparations for the erection of a new depot below the cathedral. The building will be 100 feet by 23 feet with a 15 foot platform and will contain facilities for storing freight, telegraph and station agent's offices, waiting room and baggage room. Already the tracks are being moved to make room for the new building and the old one will be torn down at once.—Herald.

DIED IN THE WOODS.—William Smith an old hunter in the Miramichi woods for the past twenty-five years, was found dead Saturday in a camp on the Little South West Miramichi, forty-six miles from Newcastle. Death seems to have been instantaneous and without any outward signs of a struggle. According to a diary near his body he must have died on Thursday, as it is kept up to that date. Just before he passed away a bear entered the camp, and, although a sick man, the hunter was able to shoot and kill the intruder.

OBITUARY.—Mrs. Robert Wasson who died at Cumberland Bay, Queen Co., N. B., on the 15th inst., leaving an aged husband and one son to mourn the loss of a devoted wife and mother, was a member of a large family. Her maiden name was Emma L. Ferris.
