What America Owes to England

Next to the deepening and enlarging o the patriotic spirit, we place as a decided gain to America, a better understanding with England.

That there did once exist in the United States a feeling of bitter antagonism to England is hardly open to question. That feeling sometimes rose to a point when it threatened to endanger the peaceful relations between the two countries, That it was fostered or even countenanced by the more intelligent citizens of the Republic, we do not believe. And we are sure that in recent years it was not to any appreciable extent reciprocated by the British. There may have been on the part of some, a little prejudice against certain peculiarities in the social life and manners of America, but there was no bitter dislike.

Brother Jonathon has generallly received a warm welcome when he has favored Canada or Great Britain with a visit. American authors have been read with avidity by English readers, American orators have been listened to with enthusiasm by English auditors, American statesmen have been regarded with respect and even reverence by English politicians, and American travellers have been received with hospitable kindness by English households. Yet, undoubtedly, there were some people in the States who suffered badly with Anglo-phobia, and many of them did all they could to infect their friends with the same virulent malady. We are happy to think that the late war has almost stamped out that dire disease. Very few of its symptoms have been noticed during the last few months. Indeed it seems to have been expelled and replaced by an epidemic of an entirely opposite character, what we might almost designate Anglo-mania. Expressions of affection have been as fervid as expressions of detestations were once ferocious. And the reason for this change is not far to seek. The time of trial and testing discovered the true friendship of England for America. Though Great Britain remained nominally neutral, it was seen that the fear of her kept other nations from allaying themselves with Spain. The voice of the British public had given forth no uncertain sound; It had declared its oneness with its transatlantic kins-

Bull was going to stand by and see fair play for his younger brother. Blood was once more found to be thicker than water. Fellow feeling between New and Old England was plainly and unmistakably manifested, and, as the poet says: "A fellow-feeling makes us wondrous kind." Soon "God Save the Queen" was rapturously sung in New York and Boston, and American victories were celebrated with rejoicing in London. On both sides the Atlantic the "Stars and Stripes" and the "Union Jack" were folded in loving embrace. One thing, too, America learned in the course of her conflict with Spain: her experience in coping with a third-rate power taught her that it is more to her advantage to have a firstrate power like England for a friend than an enemy. We do not desire to dwell upon this aspect of the question, lest we appear to be undluy boasting; but it has to be taken into account as a factor in contributing towards a more friendly attitude on the part of the United States to Great Britain. Whatever the influences which have worked towards that most blessed end, we rejoice to know that such a state of friendship has been reached. We devoutly pray that the reconciliation may not be a mere transitory one; but that it may be firmly established on a permanent basis of mutual good-will. These two great nations are so linked together by a like origin, commercial interests, common literature, family ties, inter-communication, and one mother tongue, that it would be worse than suicidal on the part of either to provoke any spirit of hostility in the other. May they not refuse to hear the call; may they not shrink from the exalted task! What magnificent opportunities there are before I love her smiles and dimples, and admire them! Our hearts beat high with hope as we think of the future they may be instru-Of her dainty, snowy fingers. I've been mental in moulding. The Czar's scheme of disarmament might then soon have a practical realization. Predictions of Hebrew prophets and ideals of Chritian teachers might then soon find their fulfilment. Then might be brought to pass the word that is written: "They shall beat their swords into plow shares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore." Then might England and the United States attain to the character and obtain the benediction set forth in the words of the world's Redeemer: "Blessed are the peace makers: for they shall be called the children of God." Farm Cleaning.

The secret of being able to keep down weeds about the premises is to either have every foot of ground occupied by animals or crops or have it in such condition that the mower may be run over it at any time.

Sickness and often death lie in a well of impure water. A dead mouse or bug will cause the water to taste and smell offensively. This is a good time to see the well is clean. If the water smells there should be no delay in going into a dug well.

To make a profit in the production of wheat at the prices it has brought during the past few years, except during the Leiter boom, we must produce a maximum crop at a minimum cost. First, we need a good seed bed; second, we need good seed, and third, we must have plant

food in the soil to produce a crop. From many orchards which might have

yielded a good crop of winter apples only a medium to short crop of inferior fruit is now expected. Such shortage, compared with a full crop as is now manifest, is due in part to reasons which could not be remedied by spraying, yet in a vast number of orchards the proper and persistent observance of this necessary branch of horticulture would have brought returns more than commensurate with the outlay of energy required.
