GRAVEL FOR THE STREETS.—A number of teams were engaged on Monday, hauling gravel, which was brought here by stmr. Martello and barge and spreading it on Main street. The work was carried on under the superintendence of Commissioner Holmes.

THE YACHT THISTLE.—The yacht Thistle owned by Messrs. G. DeVeber and A. P. Macintyre arrived here from St. John on Sunday afternoon, having made the trip from the Devil's Back to Gagetown at an average of eight miles an hour. The Thistle has had a new keel placed on her and other improvements during the winter.

WOOL TRADE OPENING.—Notwithstanding it is so early in the season the report comes from the Oxford Woolen Mills that the wool trade is opening very briskly. DEATH AT RUSAGORNISH.—Mr. Thomas Mersereau of Rusagornish station, who had been ill with dropsy for the past three months, passed peacefully away Friday, at the advanced age of seventy-eight years. He leaves one daughter, Mrs. Geo. Smith, of Gibson, and four sons, three of whom are at home and one Harry Mersereau, among the gold seekers in the Klondike. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon.

DEATH OF F. L. HAY.—A Woodstock despatch of Sunday says: "At an early hour this morning, Fred L. Hay, eldest son of Mayor W. W. Hay, died at his father's residence. About three weeks ago he had an attack of hemorrhage of the lungs and despite the best care and all that medical skill could do several attacks followed, resulting in his death. He was in the 21st year of his age and was cashier in the Nova Scotia bank agency here. He was a young man of estimable character, took an active part in the Sunday school and Christian Endeavor Society of his church and was a general favorite. The bereaved family have the deepest sympathy of the community in their great sorrow." Mr. Hay was a nephew of the Hon. Mr. Farris and was well known in this county.
