A Medical Sea Serpent.

London, Dec. 31.—The Daily Mail having published an account of a surprising operation successfully performed at Minneapolis, whereby the eye of a rabbit was transplanted and thus sight restored to a young woman blind for fifteen years I asked the opinion of a few leading surgeons here on the operation. All agreed that in the present state of scientific knowledge the reported operation was absolutely impossible.

Dr. Doven observed that even if the eye were successfully transplanted the restoration of the sight would not necessarily follow. He says it's a sort of "medical sea serpent," being a report that reappears periodically, and always,
