The grass in King Square was mowed May 23rd-the earliest in the season for many years.

Rev. William Eatough, for many years, curate of Trinity church in this city, died last Thursday morning, aged 37 years.

On Wednesday three city policemen were badly injured by an accident at Digby pier, and Matthew Dalton of the North End, fell into the harbor while drunk and was fished out with difficulty.

S. McDiarmid, who some years ago succeeded John Chaloun in the drug business at the corner of King and Germain streets, has moved his wholesale department to commodious and elegant quarters on Market Square, once the drug centre of the city, and is yet one of the best stands in the city for wholesale business. It was here that Thomas Walker & Son, William O. Smith and Thomas M. Reid did business half a century ago and amassed considerable wealth. Later A. Chipman Smith and H. L. Spencer had their establishments in the same vicinity. Mr. McDiarmid's retail department remains under the Royal Hotel at the corner of King and Germain streets and is one of the finest establishments of the kind in the Maritime provinces. During the last ten days two representatives of the largest tea growing firms in Ceylon have been interviewing the wholesale trade here and while prices of common and medium Ceylon teas have only lost part of the recent advances, one of these houses is offering standard grades of fine at lower prices than ever before. This conclusively shows that the big boom in prices will be of short duration. Another advance in molasses is due to crop failure. Extra choice P. R. is quoted at 34 cents; Barbados 32 cents and Trinidad 30 cents. Sugars are unchanged. Oatmeal is quoted at \$4.20, commeal \$2.15, Manitoba flours \$4.65 to \$4.75. Ontarios are unchanged. Canned corn has advanced to \$1.10 per dozen and cheese has declined to  $10\frac{1}{2}$  cents per pound. George S. DeForest & Sons are landing a very large shipment of cigars from Havana. The GAZETTE probably has already in type some of the details of the disastrous Indiantown fire of the 25th inst; more than 150 homes in ashes; more than 500 people homeless; more than half a million dollars worth of property destroyed in a few hours, and one lady, Miss Cunard, burned to death. Very many of these homes belonged to their occupants who had spent the best years of their life in building them up, and now they are afloat in the world. There is talk of trying to rescue the money sent to the fire sufferers of 1877 from the grasp of the socalled Relief and Aid Society, and distributing it among the victims of this calamity, but as that society withheld the money from the people to whom it was sent in 1877, it is not likely that they will relinquish it to the sufferers of 1899. SAVANNAH, Ga., May 28. - Mail advices

from Hardeeville, S. C., say: "About three miles from this village, on the Destrecher farm, on Tuesday night, May 23, occurred a terrible tragedy, in which nine persons lost their lives. A two story frame building on the farm was occupied by Jacob Solomons, his wife and seven children, the eldest aged 16 years and the youngest an infant of one year.

"On Wednesday some one passing saw that the house was gone, and on approaching to investigate found that every vestige of it was burned and the bodies of the nine occupants, or rather the charred trunks of nine human bodies, were lying in the ashes.

"The coroner's inquest, held on the 25th inst., disclosed these facts: That the house was occupied by Solomons and his family, and was shattered in the lower story by the last autumnal storms, which also carried away the chimneys; that Solomons had resorted to the makeshift of building two fires, one to cook on and the other for warmth, inside the lower stories of the house, on two circular mill saws, raised from the board floor on small pieces of iron. The smoke, sparks and fiame escaped from the fire as best they could.'

P. Nase and Son have their temporary place almost ready. They will rebuild there warehouse on Kenndy street at once.



Another boiler was found in this shop and was marked by the police for identification.

Captain Hastings and Captain Jenkins searched a number of houses, barns and sheds at Bugtown to-day, and located quite a lot of articles belonging to various people. It is believed a lot of valuable stuff was carried away to the woods







