**MARRIAGE IN THE CHURCH.**—Mr. Harry Vale and Miss C. McMullin are to be married in St. John's Church, here, this (Wednesday) morning at 8 o'clock. The Rev. Mr. Cody, of Greenwich, will officiate.

**CUT HIS HAND.**—Mr. Nathaniel Stockford while sawing wood with his sawing machine last week, at Otnabog, had the misfortune to receive a severe cut in the hand by it coming in contact with the saw.

**MR. BLAIR NOMINATED.**—The Hon. A. G. Blair was nominated by the Liberals of Restigouche, as their standard bearer at the next Dominion election, at a meeting at Campbellton on the 21st inst. Mr. Blair has not as yet accepted the nomination.

**DEATH OF A CHILD.**—The death occurred at Victoria Hospital last week of Ray, the four year old son of Mr. Frank Nasson, of Rusiagornish. The remains of the little one were prepared for interment by J. G. Adams and sent to Rusiagornish upon the 4 p. m. C. P. R. express.—Gleaner.

**PAINFUL ACCIDENT.**—Mr. Geo. Ackerman, of Gaspereau, met with a painful accident Tuesday, while shooting at a mark, at Coal Creek, his gun burst, shattering his left hand fearfully. Dr. Hay found it necessary to amputate one of his fingers.

**HEAVY WEIGHT PORKER.**—Fishery Inspector H. S. Miles, of Oromocto, killed last week a hog which he and many neighbors think will be hard to beat. The porker weighed when dressed 357 pounds. 70 pounds of lard were taken from this pig.—Gleaner.

H. White & Co., Sussex; Mr. Wilson goes to Truro, N. S., to an exceptionally good situation obtained for him by the college with the Maritime branch of the Brantford Carriage Co.—Globe.

**SHOT A WHITE DEER.**—Capt. Brennan, of the steamer May Queen has succeeded in securing a white deer. He shot it last week out back of Lower Gagetown. The animal was pure white with the exception of a few brown spots along the back. It was decorated with a beautiful set of antlers and will be placed in charge of Mr. Carnall to be mounted. The specimen is a rare one and Captain Brennan is much envied in its possession. The head and hide can be seen at the May Queen's warehouse.—Gazette.

**HOME FROM THE WEST.**—Mr. Frank Miles, of Dawson City, arrived here upon the Western express at noon to-day and registered at the Barker House, where he was met by his brothers, A. R. Miles, of Maugeville, and A. S. Miles, of Oromocto. Mr. Miles has been in Montana for several years and located at Dawson City among its first settlers. He looks like the typical Westerner and is reputed to have made considerable money.—Gleaner.

**DROWNING ACCIDENT.**—Harry Branscombe, of the Range, started to skate across the Lake on Saturday evening to meet his brother at Coal Creek, when the ice gave way and he was drowned. His body was found next morning. He was a son of Mr. Manning Branscombe and was 17 years of age. He was an employee of the Elkin's Coal Mines. The family has the sincere sympathy of the community.

**DEATH OF MR. I. EDGAR GOLDING.**—Mr. and Mrs. Albert W. Edgercombe are in St. John attending the funeral of Mr. I. Edgar Golding, of that city, a brother-in-law of Mrs. Edgercombe. Mr. Golding was a native of Wickham, Queen's County, and was well known here, especially in business circles, he having been coming here for a number of years, formerly as a representative of W. H. Thorne & Co., and more recently as traveller for Thibodeau, Frere & Co., of Quebec. Pneumonia was the immediate cause of death. Mr. Golding leaves a widow and four children. He was a member of the I. O. F. and A. H. & A. M., under whose auspices the funeral took place Monday afternoon.—Gleaner

**RECENT DEATHS.**—At Chipman, N. B., on the 2nd inst., after much suffering, Jacob Langley, aged 85 years. Mr. Langley was for many years a worthy member of Salmon Creek Church, of which he was a seacon. For several years he has been absent from his former church home, residing in Colorado and other parts in the west. In June 1898 he returned to New Brunswick greatly afflicted with kidney trouble which at times became exceedingly painful. In addition to this a malignant cancer had begun its work, thus increasing his severe affliction owing to which he could get but little rest night or day. Amid all his suffering he continued to be upheld by a hope in Christ which never failed him. He rejoiced in the sovereign grace of God, as his support to his dying hour. Bro. Langley lost his wife shortly after going to Colorado, also a beloved daughter. Two other children had also preceded him to the spirit world. Five sons and two daughters yet remain to revere his memory. May the God of all grace comfort and support them in the home of bereavement.

At St. John, N. B., Oct. 17th, Francis Best, aged 55 years. He was born at Wickham, Queens Co., and was baptised by Rev. A. B. McDonald. He was a charter member and deacon of the Tabernacle Baptist Church, St. John. He was a man of few words, gentle unassuming, and his death is keenly felt by every member of the church. A memorial service was held in the Tabernacle on Oct. 29th and the crowded house testified to the respect he was held in by all who knew him. The pastor, Rev. P. J. Stackhouse, conducted the services, assisted by Rev. Dr. Black. Much sympathy is expressed for Mrs. Best, his devoted wife in her bereavement.—The Home Mission Journal.
