**Cook's Penetrating Plasters.**

**Lawyer Steals \$1,000,000.**

Had Robert Louis Stevenson lived he would have seen last week one of his countrymen give a dramatic reality to his "Jekyll and Hyde" creation. James Colquhoun, city treasurer of Glasgow, deacon of the Free Church and representative of the city corporation on the University court, is now in gaol in his native city, charged with defalcations which a moderate estimate puts at a million dollars of trust moneys confided to him for investment.

Colquhoun is a workingman's son, born 59 years ago in Glasgow. He industriously used Scotland's educational system until he qualified as a lawyer. He rapidly became one of the most trusted members of his profession, and his prosperity was due to his almost oppressively model life. He was active on the committee of the Free Church and on the platforms of temperance meetings. He was never personally genial or popular, but raised himself to a pedestal of reputed integrity until he was the favorite model of Glasgow Sunday school teachers in showing pupils an instance of how to become a perfect citizen.

In outward appearance Colquhoun realized the idea. He was always carefully but extravagantly dressed. He was cold and serious in manner, and seemed the type of severe integrity, rewarded by the highest honors his fellow-citizens could give, until last week, when he abruptly resigned his public office and was sent to an insane asylum.

A statement authorized that he was suffering from temporary breakdown, owing to business anxieties, but the medical authorities refused to confirm the detention and a criminal warrant was executed charging him with embezzling £5,500 of his clients' money intrusted to him for investment. Other embezzlings bring the total up to £200,000, and it is believed that this will be extended.

For several years Colquhoun had been concealing his defalcations by paying interest on alleged investments which he never made. Many widows had entrusted their entire property to him, because of his high public position. His fellow-councillors at first thought of subscribing the amount to conceal the scandal until they learned the vastness of Colquhoun's embezzlements and the wreckage of his fortune. He has a wife and family.

It is stated that some years ago he won £2,000 at Monte Carlo, and since then gave way to the gambling mania. He secretly and repeatedly visited the Continental resorts, especially Ostend, and played for the highest stakes that the rules permitted. The case is expected to be one of the most remarkable criminal trials in Scotland for a generation.

**Seven Babies at a Birth.**

PITTSBURG, July 29.—What is said to be an authentic report comes from Brownsville to-night to the effect that Mrs. Geo. Hackett, colored, of that place, gave birth this afternoon to seven babies, four girls and three boys. They were all alive when born, but tonight all are dead but one. The report says they were all small, but well formed.

The parents are poor, the father being a miner. He is about 25 years old. The mother is a young woman and had two children before. She is said to be as well as can be expected and that the one child will probably live.

In Germany they have invented a machine for milking the cow, and it is now in successful operation. The principle of the machine is merely suction through long tubes. The advantages of it are saving of expense and the greatly increased cleanliness due to the fact that human hands do not have to come in contact with the cow or the milk.
