### Pork Packing.

Saturday's Sun.

The meeting in the Board of Trade  
rooms last night in the interests of pork  
packing and pork raising was well attend-  
ed. W. M. Jarvis presided.

After a few opening remarks by the  
chairman, George Robertson, M. P. P.,  
spoke on the pork raising industry and  
the establishment of a pork packing fac-  
tory in this city.

Hon. Mr. Lablillois, in response to a  
call, spoke at some length in favor of the  
establishment of a pork packing establish-  
ment in this city.

J. J. Ferguson of Ontario, said it rested  
with the farmers to supply the right  
kind of hogs. If the farmers raise hogs  
he must be assured that there will be a  
pork packing establishment. The condi-  
tions, he thought, were favorable for pork  
raising and pork packing in this province.  
He spoke of the feeding system in Onta-  
rio, and stated that in some sections  
hogs could be raised cheaper than in Onta-  
rio. Hogs enough to keep a factory in  
operation could be raised in this provin-  
ce, but if there was a scarcity there  
would be no trouble in getting a carload  
from Montreal in 24 hours. A corpora-  
tion should not start with a small capital.  
Cash must be paid for the hogs and a  
company should have a considerable sum  
of money on hand to provide material.  
The cash returns will come in slow at first  
and for this reason good provision should  
be made.

Mr. Ferguson, in reply to Dr. Gilchrist,  
answered several questions in regard to  
feeding hogs. He said in Ontario hogs  
could be sold, live weight, at an average  
of four and a half cents per pound. Mr.  
Ferguson spoke of his visit to Middleton.  
N. S., last week, where a farmer told  
him that he would supply the pork fac-  
tory with 500 hogs a year, getting his  
feed from Ontario.

W. W. Hubbard thought farmers did  
not understand swine growing, although  
there were some farmers making a good  
showing off clover. He said the farmers  
would not produce the pigs unless there  
was a market for them, and therefore it  
remained for the moneyed men to estab-  
lish the factory.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson, in response to a  
request, spoke briefly. The commis-  
sioner of agriculture had frequently brought  
before his colleagues the importance of  
pork packing factories, with the result  
that the matter has awakened consider-  
able interest. It was most important,  
the subject of establishment of a pork  
packing factory in this city. There have  
so far, however, been no practical steps  
taken to establish a factory. On the  
train he was conversing with a gentleman  
from Madawaska who sold three thousand  
dollars worth of pork each year, imported  
from Ontario. This was only one man.  
He had no policy to propound so far as  
the government was concerned beyond  
encouragement of raising of hogs. The  
government has brought the matter be-  
fore the public, and it now remains for

the business people to take hold of it.  
He did not know what better way the gov-  
ernment could aid in the establishment of  
pork packing factories than in the im-  
portation of some good breeds of stock,  
and from conversations he had had with  
his colleagues the government would be  
favorable to such an importation. He  
was present for the purpose of getting in-  
formation and learning the views of busi-  
ness men and farmers.

Dr. Gilchrist read the circular issued  
some time ago in request to the estab-  
lishment of a pork packing factory, and  
criticized the same. Afterwards the doc-  
tor spoke of the feeding of hogs, and  
pointed out that there was no necessity  
for sending to Ontario for feed. Just as  
soon as the farmers are assured there is a  
market the hogs will be forthcoming for  
a factory.

T. A. Peters, secretary for agriculture,  
on being called on said one good argument  
in favor of the establishment of a pork  
packing factory was that never had one  
failed. He said that at least after the  
first year all the hogs required would be  
forthcoming. In fact he was satisfied  
that Kings county alone would supply  
hogs enough for a St. John factory.

James Pender was of the opinion that  
it would be a good idea for the board of  
trade to endeavor to get Slipp & Flewelling  
to establish a factory in conjunction  
with other gentlemen.

T. L. Hay said the last letter he had  
received from Mr. Packerham stated  
that he offered to take stock up to ten  
thousand dollars. Mr. Hay did not think  
the prospects were favorable for the estab-  
lishment of a factory. He was, how-  
ever, willing to subscribe some stock in  
the company.

W. S. Fisher spoke of the movement  
within the past two years for the estab-  
lishment of a pork packing factory.

Frank Flewelling, of Slipp & Flewelling,  
on being called on, said the limit of his  
business was the limit of the hogs.  
He said he paid a cent to a cent and a  
half more to the farmers for their hogs  
than the Ontario farmers got.

In reply to W. W. Hubbard, Mr.  
Flewelling said he would take a carload  
of live hogs next September and pay the  
Toronto market price. Although there  
is a duty of two cents a pound, or four  
dollars a barrel, American pork is not shut  
out. The farmers will not raise hogs  
sufficient to supply the local demand.

W. M. Jarvis and Frank Flewelling  
spoke, Mr. Jarvis stating that it was ap-  
parent from all that had been said it was  
desirable to have the views of Hon. Mr.  
Emmerson carried out, namely, the im-  
portation of some good breeds of pigs.

C. J. Osman, M. P. P., of Albert, and  
Hon. Wm. Pugsley, M. P. P., Kings  
county, spoke on the subject of estab-  
lishing a pork packing factory. Both  
were in favor of the scheme.

F. L. Potts, W. S. Fisher and Capt.  
Keast spoke briefly, after which a vote  
of thanks was tendered Hon. Messrs.  
Emmerson and Lablillois, T. A. Peters,  
Mr. Ferguson and W. W. Hubbard.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley moved that a commit-  
tee be appointed to confer with the  
government as to the establishment of a  
pork packing factory at some convenient  
point within the province.

Dr. J. M. Smith seconded the resolu-  
tion.

E. Lantulum moved an amendment,  
that St. John be substituted for the  
words "some convenient point."

S. D. Scott suggested that "some con-  
venient point" be struck out.

This was accepted by Hon. Mr. Pugs-  
ley and the amendment was withdrawn.  
The motion was carried and the follow-  
ing committee appointed: Hon. Wm. P.  
Pugsley, George Robinson, M. P. P.,  
James Pender, T. L. Hay and F. L.  
Potts.

### Active Prohibitionists.

MONTREAL, March 13.—Sir Wilfrid  
Laurier's letter to the secretary of the  
Dominion Alliance announcing that the  
government had decided not to introduce  
any prohibitory legislation as a result of  
the plebiscite caused great excitement  
among temperance people here. The  
meeting of the Quebec branch of the Al-  
liance has been called for Monday to dis-  
cuss the situation. It is said a manifesto  
will be issued to the electors of Canada  
exposing what temperance people consid-  
er the duplicity of the ministry and ad-  
vising the formation at once of a third  
or prohibition party in Canadian politics,  
prohibitionists having come to the con-  
clusion that nothing is to be expected  
from either of the two old parties.

She is a Total Loss.

The new Allan Line S. S. Castilian,  
Capt. Barrett, which sailed from Port-  
land, Me., on Saturday for Liverpool, via  
Halifax, went ashore shortly after four  
o'clock on Sunday morning on what is  
known as Gannet Rock dry ledge, twelve  
miles from Yarmouth light. There was  
a dense fog at the time. The steamer  
had fifty passengers on board and a gen-  
eral cargo valued at \$450,000, the most  
valuable cargo ever shipped by the Allans  
from Portland. When the despatches  
were sent out on Sunday the ship had six  
feet of water in her hold. She was badly  
bulged up from the saloon to the fore-  
mast. A large number of sheep in the  
forward hold were drowned. The swell-  
ing of grain in the forward hold threw up  
the saloon deck. The passengers were  
taken off by a tug and landed at Yar-  
mouth. Captain Barrett and officers are  
still by the ship.

The Castilian is a new ship and was  
built by Workmen, Clark & Co., Belfast.  
She was especially designed to meet the  
requirements of the Canadian trade and  
was fitted up with all the latest improve-  
ments. She cost \$700,000.

### Chicken Fattening Stations.

The department of agriculture pro-  
poses to establish two chicken fattening  
stations in each of the maritime provinces  
during the coming summer and make  
trial shipment of poultry to England.

### Death of Hon. John F. Wood.

TORONTO, March 10.—Hon. John F.  
Wood, M. P., for Brockville, was found  
dead in his bed at the Queen's Hotel this  
city, this morning. Death resulted from  
heart failure.
