British Strikes in 1895. The annual report of Mr. J. Burnett of the Labor Department of the British Board of Trade, on strikes and lockouts, "shows that there were 816 disputes resulting in stoppage of work during 1895, and these involved 263,758 was 5,542,652, compared with 9,322,096 in 1894 and 31,205,062 in 1893. The average duration per head of disputes in 1895 was 21.6 days, as against 29.5 in the preceding year.
