QUEENS COUNTY LIQUOR MATTERS.—The announcement has been made of the passage of a resolution by the Queens County Council appointing C. W. Weyman of Kings county Inspector under the liquor law and giving him as salary all the fines and a bonus of \$15 on each conviction. Mr. Weyman has been hard at work and one of those against whom he secured a conviction was John Gale of Waterboro, whose attorney, Mr. John R. Dunn, consented to a conviction. Yesterday, on behalf of Mr. Gale, an order nisi for certiorari was received from the chief justice by Mr. L. A. Currey, to remove into the supreme court the resolution under which Mr. Weyman was appointed, with a view to quashing the same and at the same time staying all proceedings under the resolution. A second order nisi secured by Mr. Currey for Gale was to quash the conviction above referred to on the ground that the resolution was illegal and that Gale's agent could not plead guilty in his absence and without his authority. The orders are returnable at Easter term, and at present Mr. Weyman is restrained from carrying on his work under the resolution.—Telegraph.
