### TEMPERANCE COLUMN.

As no word has been forthcoming from Queens Own Lodge for so long a time, I expect the people of Queens think that it is about expiring; but not so. Queens Own is still alive, although not in as flourishing a condition as it has been in former years. During the busy summer the lodge was in a very low condition; but the work got so people could attend, they adopted a new plan of entertainment from what had been tried previously. It was as follows; Someone would pleage themselves to entertain for a certain night; they could take any plan of entertainment they chose or the could get any one to assist them that would.

The first one that volunteered to furnish entertainment spoke on the future of the British Empire. Another member took as his topic the two classes of plant life and their characteristics, and had specimens exhibiting the points touched upon. A third night oxygen and hydrogen were prepared and simple experiments performed with them.

This system seems to work very well, and the members seem to take more of of an interest than they have in the past

Between intemperance and poverty there is a two-fold relation. Drink causes poverty and poverty often drives a man to drink. It is impossible to even approximate the number of "poor" people for whose poverty liquor is responsible; but the number of paupers (people who are supported by the taxpayers) produced by drink can, to a certain extent be fairly estimated. The New Voice recently sent the following question to the almshouse in each of the 284 counties of the United States:

In your opinion what proportion of your almshouse came there, directly or indirectly, through the use or abuse of intoxicating liquors, either on the part of themselves or some one else?

From the 816 replies received, it is shown that fifty-one per cent. of the inmates of that number of almshouses became paupers through drink.

As the number of persons wholly or partially, a public charge upon the nation, is estimated to be 3,000,000, it follows upon this basis, that there are today, 1,-530,000 persons dependent wholly or partially upon the taxpayers of our country for the common necessities of life.

As the Voice pertinently comments, there are many unpreventable causes poverty and pauperism, but the most prolific cause—the saloon—is preventable. Common sense therefore calls for its abolition.—Union Signal.

Bananas in Typhoid Fever.

After a long experiment with typhoid patients, Dr. Ussery of St. Louis maintains that the best food for them is the banana. He explains by stating that in this disease the lining membrane of the small intestines becomes intensely inflamed and engorged, eventually beginning to slough away in spots, leaving well defined ulcers, at which places the intestinal walls

become dangerously thin. Now, a solid food, if taken into the stomach, is likely to produce perferation of the intestines, dire results naturally following and, this being the case, solid foods or those containing a large amount of innutritious substances are to be avoid-

ed as dangerous. But the banana, though it may be classed as a solid food containing as it does some 95 per cent. neutrition, does not possess sufficient waste to irritate the sore spots. Nearly the whole amount taken into the stomach is absorbed, giving the patient more strength than can be obtained from other food. - American Drug-


