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

The Farm.

When a horse sells for \$20,000 at auction, writes the Maine Farmer, there is little evidence of the decadance of this friend of humanity. This was the price realized for Tommy Britton, a 6-year old. Britton has won 19 heats in time better than 2-10, and out of 32 starts has won 22 first moneys, and to-day he holds the record as the world's champion trotting stallion for three heats.

Stables, for cows should be well lighted in winter, because sunlight is so essential for the light and comfort of animals. A well lighted stable does not necessarily mean a cold stable, because double sash can be used and the windows made to fit so to keep out the wind. In winter, when the thermometer is 30 degrees or so below zero, a sun bath is one of the greatest luxuriants a cow can

The pasturing of a flock of sheep on a farm is one of the most effective and important ways of improving field, and in the general rotation of crops it should be made a special part of it to have the land under the sheep's feet one year out of the number in the rotation followed. The profit from this use of the land will be more than can be made in any other way. The land is improved, troublesome weeds will be got rid of and turned to good use, and the condition of the field will be bettered in every way.

Early and late frosts are disliked by farmers, but such frosts do more harm to insects than the severe cold of winter as they catch many insects out of ground or just below the surface. It has been noticed that when the winters are severely cold, and the ground remains frozen until well into spring, insects are more numerous the following summer than when the winters are mild. It is the albernate freezing and thawing that does the damage to insects, especially when there is warm rain followed by a sudden freezing of the ground below the surface.

A new industry has just been establish. ed in Indiana by Nathan Meyer, a prominent manufacturer, and his associates. The concern is regularly incorporated under the title of the Wabash Belgian Hare Breeding and Importing company. The company will undertake to import large number of the animals from Europe and will propogate them or an 80 acre farm leased for the express purpose. A 10 acre tract has been set apart for the breeding grounds and range, and a well built rabbit house, 16 by 200 feet. has been erected to shelter the hares in bad weather.

The steer, gorged with food, and each day adding to the layer of heat-holding fat just beneath the skin, can withstand considerable cold, often showing preference for the open shed to the close stable The condition of the dairy cow is in strong opposition to this, her system being relaxed by the animal drain of maternity, and the semi-daily heavy loss of nutrients drawn from her in the abundant milk flow. The observant stockman will at once detect the fundamental difference in the condition of the dairy cow and the fattening ox in regard to ability to withstand exposure to the weather.

Our cheese exports during the season of navigation now closing probably exceeded those of last year, great as these were. At Montreal 1,852,273 boxes were taken on board by the ocean steamers, as against 1,837,435 boxes a year ago. And, though the prices ruled high nearly throughout the whole of the season of 1898, they ruled still higher in the season just closed. Of butter, 465,171 packages were shipped out of Montreal this year, as against 278,952 package last year. And butter has been very much higher this year than it was a year ago. This year's dairy receipts should be satisfactory to the farmers.

About this time of year, says the American Cultivator, as we look over the exchanges, we frequently see reports o large hogs killed by various persons each trying to outboast the one who made the previous report and every time we see such a report we feel like saying, "The bigger the hog the bigger the tool who fattened it." There is but one excuse for having such extraordinary weight in hogs. When one has an old hog, kept for breeding purposes until it is 5 or 6 years old, if fattened it will be a large one very naturally, but we think the owner o such an animal would save more money to kill and bury it than to try to get

Competitive Candy.

A girl who works in a candy factory at Hoboken N. J., tells some curious stories | Home. of the way candies are made there. The men smoke and chew while at work, and, she says, often spit into the sugar boilers. Since she has worked there she has been so disgusted that she says she will never eat any more candy. At this same factory seventeen girls have just been laid off and a machine managed by a boy who gets \$4 a week does the same work formerly done by the girls. The girls used to get \$3 each. The manager said the Saturday after the girls were laid off that his head used to ache when he had to pay the work bill at the end of the week, but now he said his headache was gone. Recipes.

Cream Cake—One half cup of sweet cream, one cup of sugar, three eggs, one the order named, beat thoroughly, and bake in jelly tins. Spread between the cakes after baking a filling made of one half cup of very thick sweet cream into which has been stirred one cup of powa little vanila.

Soft Molasses Gingerbread-One cup of Molasses, one teaspoonful of soda, one teaspoonful of ginger, one tablespoonful of buster, stir this together, and then pour on one half cup of boiling water, one pint of flour, bake about one inch deep in a sheet. This is very nice, if pains are taken to have the water hoiling, and to beat it well when the flour is

Baked Cornmeal Pudding .- Scald one quart of milk, stir into it seven tablespoonfuls of meal, one cup of molasses, one teaspoonful of salt one half a teaspoonful of ginger, one half a teaspoonful of cinnamon, pour in a little cold milk after it is all mixed, and bake two hours and a half. With sweet cream it is excellent.

White Mountain Cake.-Four eggs, two cups of sugar, one cup of butter, three cups of flour, one cup of sweet milk, one teaspoonful of cream of tartar, one half teaspoonful of soda, one teaspoonful of lemon or vanilla.

Wedding Cake. - One and a half pounds of butter, one and a half pounds of dark brown sugar, one and a half pounds of flour, one and a half dozen eggs, leaving Catalogues. one half of the whites for frosting, one cup of molasses, one dessert spoonful soda, dry, two dessert spoonfuls cassia, two dessert spoonfuls mace, two dessert spoonfuls allspice, two dessert spoonfuls nutmeg, two dessert spoonfuls clove, three pounds raisins, three pounds currants, one and a half pounds citron, juice and rind of four lemons.

Cream Doughnuts-Beat together one cup of sugar, one small cup of sour cream, one level teaspoonful of soda, two eggs, a little salt and cinnamon. Mix with floor enough to roll.

Ginger Bread. - One cup of butter, one cup of sweet milk, two eggs, one large cup of molasses, two teaspoonfuls of soda, one tablespoonful of ginger. Add floor to mix like cake batter.

Virtue Cake. - Three whole eggs and the yolks of two more, two cups of sugar, one cup of butter, one cup of milk, three cups of flour one teaspoonful cream tartar half a teaspoonful of soda. Use the two whites for frosting.

Cookies. -One-half cup of butter, one cup of sugar, two and a half cups of flour, two eggs, one teaspoonful of cream tartar, half teaspoonful of soda. Roll very thin.

Loaf Cake. - Three cups of milk (warm) two cups of sugar, one cup of yeast, flour till the spoon will stand in the mixture. Let it rise light, then add two cups of sugar, two of butter, two eggs, and spice to taste. Beat thoroughly, put in tins and let it rise again.

Patty-pan Cake.-One cup of sugar, one cup of flour, two tablespoonfuls melted butter, four tablespoonfuls sweet milk one teaspoonful cream tartar, one half teaspoonful of soda and two eggs.

Keep Your Mouth Shut.

People who keep their mouths closed except when they are talking, eating or drinking rarely contracts coughs or colds. Savages, even those living in northern

direct route into the lungs of a person who breathes through his mouth. They are arrested by the fine sieve-like network of hair in the nortrils of person who breath through the nose. Keep your month shut, and you may defy pesti-

The teeth suffer from too much and too frequent exposure to the atmosphere. Sudden changes of temperature, whether liquid or atmospheric are hurtful to them. The best teeth in the world are those of savage tribes who always keep their mouths shut except when talking or eating. Throat and lung diseases are often contracted by persons who go out openmouthed.
