Small lots of Nova Scotia apples are arriving; red astrachans are quoted at \$1.25 to \$1.75 per barrel. The market is over stocked with eggs and price has dropped to 13 cents. Choice butter is in limited supply and arrivals are quickly taken up at 14

Fell to His Death.

A terrible accident occurred this afternoon shortly after two o'clock on the new I. C. R. elevator.

Two men fell from the top of the building, a distance of more than fifty feet, and one was instantly killed, having his brains dashed out on the solid flooring of the immense structure.

Four men, it seems, who were working on the inside of the elevator near the top undertook to raise their staging, a light structure. They were holding it in position with their hands, preparatory to making it secure, when some lumber fell from above and striking on the staging knocked it from their grasp. The blow, which was at one end of the staging, caused the two men at that end to lose their footing and they fell headlong down through a narrow opening not more than four feet wide, and intersected by a heavy

The man who was killed struck on the top of his head on the heavy flooring timbers. He was a frightful looking sight. His brains were scattered all over the flooring and the blood spurting, staining the wood work and flowing in a stream down on the underpinnings. Apparently he was not injured about the body. After some time had elapsed he was identified as Herbert Harris, aged 27, hailing from Truro, N. S. He and his wife boarded at 97 Britain street. His body was taken to Mr. Chamberlain's undertaking premises.

Harris's companion was John McEachern, a Chipman, Queens county, youth, a son of Mr. Donald McEacheron, blacksmith. He escaped without external injury, but at 3 o'clock the doctors were unable to say whether or not he had been injured internally. McEacheron told the Globe that he was feeling first rate. He did not known just what had happened.

Important to Farmers.

Professor Robertson, Commissioner of August 30th for the Maritime Provinces in connection with the establishment of chicken fattening stations, and also to arrange for the establishment of creameries in some parts of Nova Scotia, where co-operative dairy work has not yet been introduced or been successful. The provincial government of Nova Scotia has made provision for granting a sum of about twelve hundred dollars each county where a successful creamery or cheese factory is not yet in operation. The Dominion Department of Agriculture will undertake to run these creameries for a few years on a plan similar to that which was followed in Prince Edward Island and which has been eminently successful and satisfactory there.




