TO BE REPAIRED.—For years down river residents, living along the highway road, which runs through the interval lands between Sheffield and Jemseg, have suffered great inconvenience by having portions of the road washed away by disastrous freshets. 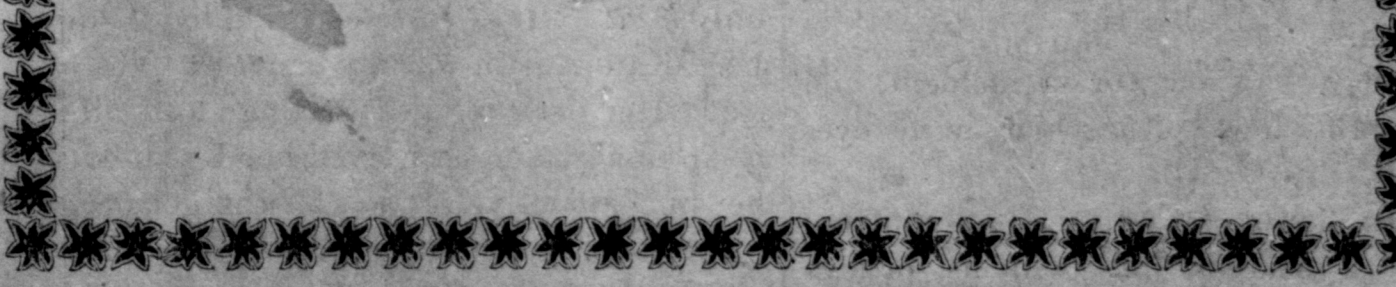
