### One Way of Burying the Hatchet.

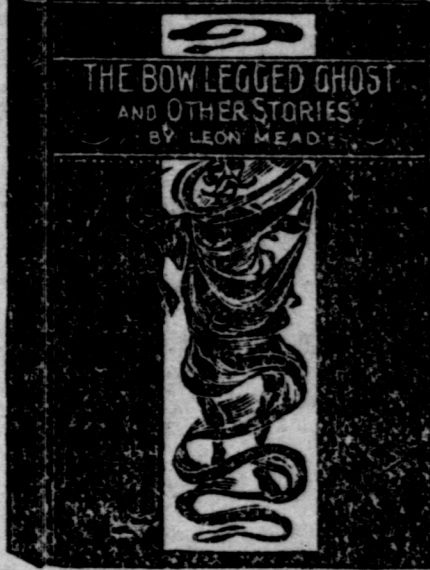
