
#### A LIFETIME TOO LATE.

"Twas about that time father went under; He failed and lost all that he had, And a glass followed only too soon.


And many a time I have sat there, Halt drunk, and I've wished that I might, For you see, sir, a tellow gets lonesome, With no home except a hotel,
