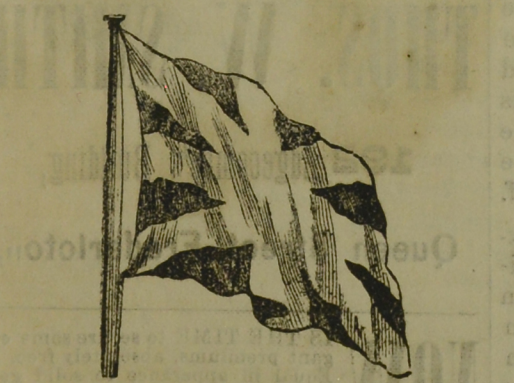

At the time of my last writing I was as sure of attending the session of the Grand Division as I was of anything in this changing world, but "The best laid plans of mice and men gang oft a glee" and circumstances arose, over which I had no control, which made it im-

possible for me to leave business just at that time. It was a great disappointment not to be able to fulfil my anticipations and meet with many friends and co-workers in the cause, and since reading the somewhat limited accounts of the session which have appeared in the daily papers, I realize more keenly what I missed. The report of the G. W. P. on the work of the past year must be very encouraging indeed to every member of the order, and should stimulate us all to renewed effort in the year upon which we have just entered. I believe the order is in a better condition today in this province than at any previous time in its history and it rests with every member, individually, to see to it that the movement is forward rather than backward from this time, that the close of another year may find us in the front rank in point of numbers and influence.

It is gratifying to the members of "Old Howard" who are acquainted with Bro. Anslow to see him at the head of the order and we can claim him I think as a former member of our division for if I am not mistaken he was initiated into the order in Howard No. 1 and was for some time an active member in her ranks. His reputation as an earnest, consistent temperance worker is well established and under his administration we may look for a continuance of the prosperity that has characterized the year just past. Our good friends in Moncton seem to be experiencing some little difficulty in the enforcement of the law and in their efforts they have the sympathy and best wishes of those of us who are undergoing a similar experience here in St. Stephen.

I trust that they may find their way out of the difficulties which surround them and that truth and justice may prevail not only with them but within the whole of this Dominion of ours.

The arrangement made at the session for the propagation work of the order will, I think, commend itself to all who are interested in the spread of our principles throughout the province, and it is pleasant to know that the order is in so prosperous a condition as to be able to devote so much of her funds to propagation work. With a judicious and careful distribution of this fund we ought to see some good results and be able to record many new divisions in districts hitherto neglected. Last Friday night our hall presented something of the appearance it did last winter when we had such a large attendance and at the close of the session many remarks were heard tending to show that it had been both a profitable and enjoyable time to those present. Two candidates were initiated and the entertainment committee had provided a good programme, which was well rendered, as follows: Temperance reading, L W Hughes; Song, W E Smith; Reading, Sedge Webber; Song, Miss Grace Olive. Brief but enthusiastic addresses were delivered by Rev G M Campbell, Rev G Shore and Rev R M Hunt all of whom expressed their willingness to do anything within their power in the way of promoting the interests of the Division, and of temperance in the Division or on the platform during the coming winter. In response to a request from the chair Bro Geo J Clarke gave an account of the recent trip by some of the members of the division to Rolling Dam, and that reminds me that I promised to give you a sketch of that trip.

We left town about 4.30 on the afternoon of Monday last, nine of us, in a comfortable vehicle, with Bro. Whitlock holding the ribbons over as fine a pair of horses as one could wish to sit behind. It is just as well for the coming candidates to know that upon this question there has got to be a decided expression of opinion, as Prohibition is the coming question to be decided at the polls. There will be a good many prohibition candidates in the field throughout Canada within the next few months.
