THE LATEBRITISH ELECTIONS.

In the excitement over the fact of the continuation in power or the overthrow of the British Government, a great many people have not looked at the result of the late elections in Great Britain from a temperance stand-point. As in the elections in our neighbouring republic, this has had an important influence on the elections, and when it comes to a emperance vote in the House it will be seen that the temperance reprecentatives are in the majority. The result of the elections is thus briefly stated by the Alliance News (Manchester) on the 19th:-

"A few more mames, which we give this week, on the opposite page, bring up nearly the whole tale of new members favorable to temperance legislation. We now are able to count three hundred and forty-eight men willing to vote for Local Option of some kind, including Prohibition; and of these, two hundred and one are pledged to vote for the Direct Popular Veto. THE MODERATE DRINKER.

The Journal of Inebriety, in a very suggestive article upon the early stages of inebriety, says:

"It is not will power which makes the difference between the inebriate and the moderate drinker; it is physiological and pathological conditions of the brain and nervous system, which the possessor ascribes to will power. Alcohol cannot be used in the nerve centers.

The moderate drinker is always diseased, although to the non-expert there are no clears ymptoms or coarse lessons that can be seen. Moderate users of alcohol die from diseases provoked and stimulated by this drug. But only a small percentage of moderate drinkers remain so until death. The disease goes on to full development in inebriety in a vast majority of cases.
