TEMPERANCE NEWS AND NOTES.

The Swedish Government has appropriated \$5000 a year for the promotion of temperance.

In twenty-five years the sale of beer in America has steadily increased from two million barrels to over twenty-four millions. In the last nine years it has more than doubled.

The homeopathic hospital in Philadelphia was successful in restoring patients from typhoid fever last year without the use of alcoholic stimulants.

A west point cadet who violates the law against cigarette smoking is obliged to pace back and forth, rain or shine, for twelve hours, with a musket on his shoulder.

A New York brewer places the average number of glasses of beer consumed by his employes during one day, at seventy-five apiece, each glass holding half a pint.

A jury in New York State has awarded an only child \$4000 against a Hudson River steamboat company, under the Civil Service Damage Act, for the death of her father, a deck-hand, who became inebriated at the steamboat bar and fell off into the river and was drowned. The court has refused to set the verdict aside, and steamboats in the State are warned that they keep open bars at their peril.

A temperance society of more than 100 members was recently organized among the men in the military prison at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, by Mrs. Julia A. Chase, an active worker among soldiers and sailors, who on this occasion delivered an address of such power that seventy-five men who had never signed the pledge before unhesitatingly gave their names and affirmed their purpose to lead sober lives.

An Australian writer says that in spite of every effort the drink bill of that country is alarmingly increasing, and that crime, social evils, insanity and suicide are keeping ghastly pace with it. He adds that great injury is done by American telegrams that publish in every nook and corner the defeats of Prohibition, but never even mention its victories, thus spreading the impression that the struggle is hopeless.

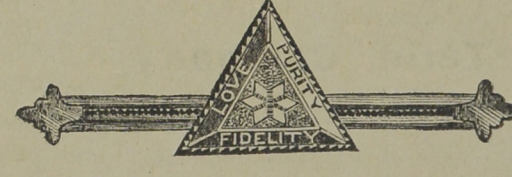
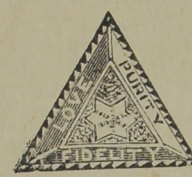
RESOLUTION.
