EDITOR OF JOURNAL, We here on the Pacific Coast have read with a great deal of interest the proceedings of your Grand Division, some of the names of the officers and committees are familiar, and others are relatives of some of our prominent Sons of Temperance here, one in particular Miss Wadman of Charlottetown P E I, is a near relative of our G W P, Wm B Wadman.

It must be gratifying to every S of T to read of the progress the order is making in the Provinces, the action of your G D in the matter of appointing delegates to the Prohibition Convention pleased your correspondent more than any other act of that Grand body; it is time for every advocate of temperance to wake-up to the fact that the liquor traffic is carried on under and by the authority of law, every child knows that; therefore it is carried on, under the protection and by the authority of the people, for is not the people the law makers? And it is the privilege and the duty of the law makers when they find that a law is defective, or works a hardship on the people to change it. Now the law that grants one portion of a community a licence to injure the other portion of the community is defective, and ought to, and must be changed. There is not one person but what will say yes that is so, but how are you going to change it? We answer by taking temperance into politics; (and by the way don't wait for election day before you act) you must go to the conventions where candidates are nominated and see that men are placed in nomination whom you can depend upon, and then on election day vote for those men. They will be your representatives in the law making and law revising machinery of your districts when the question of Licensing the traffic came before the legislation body. If I win there and a member of that body I would introduce a bill granting a License to burglars, highway men and house burners. Then I would take the floor and defend my position with as good an argument and as sound logic (defending personal liberty) as the hon-member who presented the bill asking the people to grant a license to persons that they might carry on a business which would be the means of separating husband and wife, squandering the earnings of the husband and father that is needed for the support of his family, debasing men and women by blunting their intellect, destroying all sense of propriety, inciting them to the commission of every crime the conviction of which confines them in reformatory or penitentiary institutions to be supported by a tax collected from the industrial portion of the community. If it is good judgment in a legislative body to grant a license for carrying on such a business, why not grant a license for the privilege to commit any of the crimes above mentioned?

The Order of the Sons of Temperance has been the van-guard of the temperance agitation for over 47 years, it is our duty to still keep it in the front rank by proclaiming aloud the doctrine of Prohibition. The time is not far distant when the cry will be taken up by these people who now advocate high license, they admit that something must be done to check this growing evil, they therefore recommend high license. High license will prove as much of a failure as moral suasion did in remedying the evil. The time is past (if ever it existed) that the people will rest satisfied with a law licensing crime. We are making some headway on this Pacific coast, the Divisions in and around San Francisco are gaining in membership. Bay View Division of West Oakland is growing rapidly. They initiated 5 candidates last Saturday evening. Silver Star, New Era, and Centennial of this city are doing well. A very pleasant time was held at Centennial's meeting on last Monday evening. Past Grand Worthy Patriarch Davison and Past Grand Worthy Associate Irving was presented with a National Regalia each by the Grand Scribe in behalf of the Grand Division. A Musical and literary programme was successfully carried out consisting of song by Grand Worthy Associate Sister E. P. Star, Recitation sister Duncan of New Era. The G. W. P. Bro Wadman is hard at work in the Southern part of the State. He has organized a new Div. in San Diego and one in a town near the Mexican line called OTAY DIVISION. He is now at work in his own country (Los Angeles) when he expects to organize a number of Divisions and after the holidays will come up here and organize in this end of the state. Mother!

There is a serpent dragging its length through our land, side by side with the old serpent, Rum. Fathers, mothers, do you know him? If not, it is high time you were making his acquaintance. He is very smooth and shiny, as serpents are wont to be, and he wriggles himself into the happiest homes and fills them with grief. He may come in the form of a young man, handsome, gay, attractive.

Have you a young girl just budding into womanhood who is the personification of virtue and purity? This vile serpent beholds her with a greedy eye. She is full of youthful spirits and must have youthful amusements. Certainly, and here is a most respectable young man waiting to be a gallant escort in quest of pleasure. And so she launches on the tide of gayety little thinking that the man at her side is a serpent in human form whose venomous sting will send poison through her life never to be wholly eradicated. The months fly quickly by and ere you are aware of it your beautiful, innocent girl is flung back at your feet a fallen and degraded woman. Every one has seen such pictures too vividly portrayed in human life. The girl is spurned, looked down upon, made to feel that she has committed the unpardonable sin and hurried on to the yawning abyss from which she might have been rescued if Christian people had not been like the Pharisee of old who "passed by on the other side." But it was not my purpose to write an essay on the duties of Christians to fallen womanhood, but to try to suggest a means whereby some may be kept from falling. It seems to me that every mother should instruct her daughters in vice as well as virtue. Tell them of the great evil that exists in social life and warn them against it.
