OPINION OF AN EXPERT IN NERVE AND BRAIN DISEASES.

Two Men.

Two men, one a total abstainer another a drinker, each spend \$100 in two months. The first pays his \$100 for furniture and the other for liquor. The first receives actual value and his home shows the result of his purchase. The second loses his money, receives in return that which makes him a brute and a loafer. Out of the \$100 spent for furniture enough goes to employ twelve men for one day at \$2 each. Out of the \$100 spent for liquor, enough goes to labour to hire one man for one day. Suppose all the saloons were closed, the \$85,000,-000 now expended for liquor in Pennsylvania would be spent for furniture, boots and shoes, carpets, hardware, etc. The money would employ twelve men where but one is employed now. The twelve men would spend for other necessaries twelve times as much as the one man. Taxation would immediately commence to be reduced, for crime and pauperism would decrease.—People.
