Communication from Liberia was referred to the Committee on State of the Order.

Rep C A Baldwin, of Conn, presented a communication from the Grand Division of Conn, which was referred to Committee on Constitution.

The appeals from the action of the Grand Divisions of New Hampshire and Florida, were referred to Committee on Appeals.

Rep J R Hargin, of N J, offered an amendment to the Constitution, which was referred to the Committee on Constitutions.

On motion the National Division was declared in recess until 3 o'clock P M.

#### FIRST DAY.

##### AFTERNOON SITTING.

The National Division reassembled at 3 o'clock P M.

Officers present, the same as the morning session.

Rep Rev A W Cummings, of W N Y, offered an amendment relating to Honorary members, which was referred to the Committee on Constitutions.

Rep J Parsons, from the Committee on Distribution, presented report.

On motion, the vote making the report of the Committee on Juvenile Work the special order for Thursday morning at 10 o'clock, was reconsidered, and the report was made the special assignment for this afternoon immediately following the fixing of the place and time for the next Annual Session.

Rep H B Howell, of N J, offered an amendment to the Code of Laws. Referred to the Committee on Constitutions.

Rep H H Pitts, of N B, offered a resolution in reference to changing the date of the fiscal year from Dec 31 to March 31 Referred to Committee on Constitutions.

Rep J Parsons, of Nova Scotia, offered an order in reference to a supplementary form of returns. P M W P, E H Clapp, moved to refer to the Committee on State of the Order.

P M W P, L Wagner, moved to amend by referring same to Committee on Constitutions. The amendment was adopted, and paper referred to Committee on Constitutions.

Rep H H Pitts, of N B, offered a resolution calling for the appointment of a Committee to prepare a form of certificate of membership,

which was referred to the Committee on Ceremonies and Regalia.

Rep H H Pitts, of N B, offered a resolution in reference to a badge, which was referred to the Committee on State of the Order.

##### PLACE AND TIME FOR NEXT SESSION.

The hour having arrived, the National Division proceeded to the consideration of the special assignment, viz: the fixing of the place and time for holding the next Annual Session. Bar Harbor, Me; Minneapolis, Minn; and Ocean Grove, N J; were placed in nomination.

Reps W H Bewell, of Ont, and H C H Lewis, of Vt, were appointed tellers. The first ballot was cast, and vote announced as follows: Minneapolis, 17; Bar Harbor, 26; Ocean Grove, 35; and there was no choice.

The second ballot was taken, and vote announced as follows: Minneapolis, 1; Bar Harbor, 34; Ocean Grove, 44; and Ocean Grove, N J, was declared selected.

On motion, the second week of July was fixed as the date of the 46th Session, with the understanding that the executive officers of the N D have authority to change the time, if after consultation with the authorities at Ocean Grove, it is deemed advisable.

##### REPORT OF PROPAGATION COMMITTEE ON JUVENILE WORK.

The Propagation Committee, by P M W P, F M Bradley, presented report.

#### SECOND DAY, MORNING SITTING.

The National Division reassembled at nine o'clock A M.

Officers present same as yesterday. Opened in form.

On motion, the National Division was declared in recess until three o'clock P M.

##### AFTERNOON SITTING.

The National Division reassembled at three o'clock. The Journal of yesterday's sessions was read and approved.

P M W P, J N Stearns, from the Committee of the Grand Division of E N Y on behalf of the Grand Division, presented to the members of the National Division a *souvenir* of Saratoga.

Rep T Caswell, of Ont, moved that a Committee of three be appointed to obtain the names of the visitors present for publication in the Appendix of the Journal. The motion was adopted, and Reps J Brooks, of Ont; Harry C Jones, of Penn, and J H Hoagland, of N J, were appointed the Committee.

Rep H C H Lewis, of Vt, presented a request from the Grand Division of Vt, for a new charter, which was referred to the Committee on State of the Order.

Rep H H Pitts, of N B, offered an amendment to the Constitution, which was referred to the Committee on Constitutions.

The National Division then resumed consideration of the business pending at the hour of adjournment yesterday, viz:—the adoption of the report of the Committee on Juvenile Work. After a protracted discussion, the previous question was ordered, and the National Division proceeded to vote on the report *seriatim*.

The first recommendation was adopted, Yeas 37; Nays 14. The yeas and nays were called for, and resulted as follows: Yeas 55, Nays 15. The 2d—8th, inclusive, recommendations, were declared adopted, yeas 46, nays 2. The 10th adopted, yeas 37, nays 2. The 19th, 11th, 12th and 13th were unanimously adopted.

The report as a whole was then adopted by the following vote. Yeas 46, nays 3. On motion of the Most Worthy Scribe, voted that a Committee of One on Communication with Absent Members be now appointed. The Most Worthy Patriarch appointed Rep H H Pitts, of N B, the Committee. P M W P, S B Ransom, for the trustees, presented their annual report, which was adopted and ordered entered on the written Journal.

##### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE ORDER.

P M W A, G M Rose, for Committee on the State of the Order, presented the following report, which was adopted:

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N Y,  
June 26th, 1889.

To the Members of the National Division:

Your Committee on the State of the Order, to whom was referred,

first, the communication of H S Bell, W P, and the officers of United Division, No 1, of Cape Palmas, Republic of Liberia, asking for charter, books, etc., for said Division, beg to recommend that this matter be referred to the executive officers of the National Division, with power to take such action as they may deem proper.

Second, The resolution of Rep H H Pitts, viz: "That the National Division recommend to Grand Division the adoption of a uniform and inexpensive badge to be worn by members in public, that they may be recognized as Sons of Temperance." The matter has already been provided for, *vide* Journal, page 1542, Digest No 153, as follows: "The badge of the Order to be worn in public shall be a triangle three quarters of an inch high, with one six pointed star in the centre for members of Subordinate Divisions; two stars for members of the Grand Division; and the three stars for members of the National Division. The sides of the triangle to be engraved as follows: Love and Purity, and on the base, Fidelity. The same to be made of yellow metal."

Third, The petition of the Grand Division of Vermont, praying that a new charter be granted them, the original having been destroyed by fire in 1885. We recommend that the prayer of their petition be granted.

The National Division reassembled at eight o'clock P M. Officers present same as at previous sitting.

##### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON APPEALS, NO 1.

The Committee on Appeals, by Rev C Henry Mead, of W N Y, presented the following report, which was adopted:

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N Y,  
June 27, 1889.

To the National Division, S of T:

The Committee on Appeals beg leave to report that they have considered the appeal of W H Johns vs the Grand Division of N H, the particulars of which appear to be these: A member of a Subordinate Division, expecting to leave town, was permitted to withdraw from the Order. Plans changing, she applied to be restored to membership. The Division voted to receive her, and the W P decided that she could do so by simply resigning the Constitution and paying the initiation fee without re-obligation. An appeal was taken from the decision of the W P, to the Division, and the decision was reversed. An appeal was taken to the G W P, and he reversed the decision of the Division. A further appeal was taken from his decision to the Grand Division, and the latter body reversed the decision of the G W P. An appeal is now taken from the Grand Division to this body under Chapter 8, Section 2, Code of Laws. "The payment of the initiation fee and re-signing the Constitution is sufficient," and we therefore recommend that the appeal be sustained.

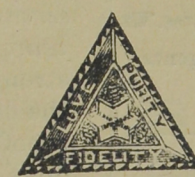
