Report of District Division of York and Cumberland Counties.

The Semi-Annual Session of the District Division of Sons of Temperance of York and Cumberland Counties, was held Thursday, Aug 8th, 1889, at Stuarts Grove at the head of Duck Pond, Windham Maine. The Division was called to order by D W P, E H Dolley.

Com on Credentials reported delegates from different Divisions as follows:

Pine Tree Division, eleven; Rechab, eleven; Mystic, three; Cumberland, two; Lake Side, one; Elm, one; Forest City one; Mountain Echo, one; thirty-one in all.

After the usual routine of business, the meeting was adjourned to meet with Mystic Division West Gray, the date to be decided by the D R S, I W Kemp.

Dinner was then served in the Grove, and two hundred worthy members and actual workers in the cause, partook of the bountiful feast prepared and served by Pine Tree Division. We then marched to the shore of the Pond whose still waters presented a beautiful aspect and afforded pleasure both for young and old. We there listened to remarks by Evelyn Prescott, of S Windham Division; Fred Stevens, Rechab Division; Mrs Hall, Elm Division; S L Carleton, Forest City Division; C M Stuart and Peter Stuart of Pine Tree Division; which were duly appreciated and well applauded by both members and spectators.

The rest of the afternoon was spent and enjoyed by the old and middle aged in watching the different games of the young; such as base ball, foot race, three-legged race, jumping, etc. The games were won as follows: Base Ball, Rechab Division; foot race by S P Hanson, of Pine Tree Division; three-legged race, by two boys from Rechab Division, who distanced the field and proved themselves to be experts; jumping by S W Lowell, of Elm Division, satisfying the crowd beyond a doubt that Elm Division has a good jumper as well as a reliable W P. The games were then called and decided in a manner, satisfactory to all, then the crowd returned once more to the grove well pleased with the sports of the day and a good appetite for supper which was served by the ladies of Pine Tree Division, whose skill in this capacity we consider to none, though their display had to be made under difficulties.

A public meeting was held in the evening and we listened to a select reading by Bro Maxfield of Mystic Division, one of the finest readers in the State. We then listened with pleasure to some very eloquent remarks by Mr Prescott of South

Windham, one of the finest and ablest young men in our community, whose influence has all ready been felt in every avenue of society, and its of that enduring kind that will reach beyond the grave. We have had reasons to lament that the District Division in the past has not been altogether a success. At our last annual session we barely had a quorum; this failure was due to the neglect of some of our important officers who should have been present on that occasion, but we have every reason to rejoice to-day and take new courage as we look over the field and view the vast numbers that swell our ranks, from the P M W P of North America down to the members of the Subordinate Divisions well dotted in and finely vervegated with Cadets of Temperance. Here we find there are very many important matters to be taken into consideration. As a matter of course the success of the District Division depends upon the punctuality and generosity of all Subordinate Divisions, a matter that should be considered by all. We are very apt and sometimes do look for success without making very much of an effort to attain it. In this case we always suffer defeat and come short of our anticipated glory.
