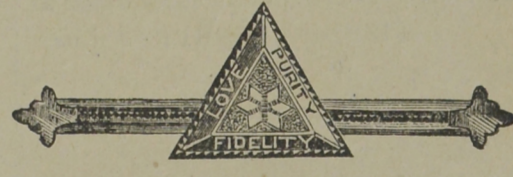
RESOLUTION.
