Grand Division Representatives and Members.—The 40th Annual Session of the Grand Division will be held (D V) in the City of Kingston, commencing Tuesday, December 3rd, 1889.

The Grand Division will meet in the Lecture Room of the Sydenham Street Church, or in the Oddfellows' Hall, at 2 o'clock, p. m.

Good Hotel accommodation will be available. Hotel Frontenac and British American Hotel, each \$2.00 per day. City Hotel, \$1.25 to \$1.50 per day. Anglo-American, Globe, Windsor, Union, Grimison's, American and Stanley Hotels, each \$1.00 per day.

Representatives or members wishing to secure rooms or information relative to the arrangements for the Session, should write Bro Wm McRossie, P G W A, Kingston Ont.

The Grand Trunk, Canadian Pacific, Central Ontario, and Kingston and Pembroke Railways, including branches, will carry representatives and members to and from the Session at one and one-third single fare for the round trip, according to certificates which I will forward on application, and which must be presented to the ticket agent at the starting point and to the Grand Scribe at the Session for signatures, etc.

Representatives and members travelling by the G T R, by the K and P or by the C P R and K and P will require but one certificate each for the round trip, and should buy tickets from starting point to Kingston.

Representatives and members travelling by C P R and G T R, or by the Central Ontario and G T R, will require two certificates, one for each line, and should buy tickets from starting point to Toronto, Brockville, Prescott or Trenton as may be convenient, and thence to Kingston.

These certificates will be honored, in going, from three days before the opening, and on returning, until three days after the closing of the session, (Sundays not included.)

The Session will be a most important one. Live issues, both special to the Order and of general interest, will receive careful and practical attention.

The reports of the Grand Officers and the various Committees, the petitions from District and Subordinate Divisions, and the resolutions to be submitted will present matters of vital interest to all lovers of our Order, and the principles it so successfully seeks to establish.

The Origin of Constitutional Prohibition.

THE movement for a prohibitory constitutional amendment originated in the Order of the Sons of Temperance of Eastern New York in 1856. Court of Appeals had just decided prohibitory law of the State unconstitutional, and Wm. H. Armstrong, Esq., then chief officer of the Order, conceived the idea of a constitutional amendment, recommended it and Division in January,

1857, and it received unanimous endorsement.

The Daily Times of January 19, 1857, in an editorial, said:

The G. W. P.'s report contained a strong recommendation of an effort to introduce a prohibitory provision into the State constitution by amendment. This plan was urged as being an appeal directly to the people, to be decided by them by ballot, after the amendment shall have passed one Legislature, and been again passed by the succeeding Legislature, chosen after three months' publication of the amendment (vide State Const. Art. 13). That if the proposed amendment shall pass such an ordeal, the sovereign people thus determining thrice in its favour, the moral effect will be such as to ensure the enforcement of the provision, and on its good fruits showing themselves on every hand, the popularity of prohibition will become universal, and the blessings of freedom from the evils of intemperance will become perpetual in this State.

The following prohibitory amendment was introduced into the Legislature of 1860-61 (see New York Tribune of April 9 1860):

Resolved (if the assembly concur) That the constitution of the State be amended as follows:

The sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage is hereby prohibited, and no law shall be enacted or be in force after the adoption of this amendment to authorize such sale, and the Legislature shall by law prescribe the necessary fines and penalties for any violation of this provision.

Resolved (if the assembly concur) That the foregoing amendment be referred to the Legislature, to be chosen at the general election of senators, and that, in conformity to Section 1 of Article 13 of the constitution, it be published for three months previous to the time of such election.

It was reported upon favorably by the appropriate committees of each House. From the Senate Committee's report, submitted April 6 1860, we make the following extract:

It is, by the concurrent resolutions reported by your committee, proposed to submit this whole question to the people, from whom all power emanates, and as a majority decide so let it be determined; and it is believed that, if a full and fair discussion of the question be had before the people, that the decision will be in favor of the amendment proposed; and when that decision is made it should be final, and not left to changeable legislation; and, therefore, it is proposed by the amendment reported to engraft it into the Constitution and make it a part of the organic law.

Your committee believe that the plan proposed by them is a proper one to remedy the evil. After it shall have received the sanction of this Legislature, and the Legislature to be chosen at the next general election of Senators, it will be submitted to the people, it is hoped, at a special election, where it will be decided upon its own issue and merits, unmingled with any political issues or considerations, leaving the people free to vote upon this question, irrespective of party; this question has already embarrassed political parties too long, and should be removed therefrom by the mode proposed.

That the amendment proposed in the resolution herewith reported will receive the full and candid consideration of the Senate, and such action taken thereon as shall rebound to the honor and glory of the State and the best interests of the people, is the sincere desire of the committee.

The amendment was adopted in the Senate of the State of New York on the 13th of March, 1861, by a vote of 20 to 6, all the Republicans and one Democrat voting in the affirmative, and all the other Democrats voting in the negative, and by the Assembly 69 to 33 on the 5th of April, 1861.

This was officially advertised according to law in the daily papers of the time by the clerks of the Senate and Assembly.

Mr Armstrong, in writing upon this subject, says:

It will be observed that the last step was their passage by the State Assembly on the 5th of April, 1861. Alas! that it was that date; for in seven days thereafter the cannon-shot fired at Fort Sumter not only ushered in the great war of the Rebellion, but shattered the fair prospects of the consummation of the first prohibitory constitutional amendment ever passed by the Legislature of any State.

It is needless to show how the civil war prevented all further successful consideration of the subject; and when the war was over the demoralization induced by it, on the subject of liquor-drinking, prevented any success for years afterward.

Hard at Work.

The Scott Act committees in the several Wards have taken great interest in the approaching contest. After comparing notes it is found that the moral side of the rum business is engaging the attention of many voters who formerly argued for licensed taverns from a financial view. Consequently several gentlemen have in a pronounced manner stated this year that they will vote for the Scott Act. Such cases are cheering, and we have no fear that any brightening prospects of victory will in the least degree tend to make the committees relinquish their efforts. All friends of the Act do not seem to look for many votes in Queen's Ward, and the committees expect the rum party to obtain a good majority of voters there. But this estimate may be not warranted this time as our citizens generally dislike the thought of having an open rum shop located in their neighborhood. All the other Wards will show a majority for the Scott Act, and St. Ann's and Carleton may be depended on for respectable majorities. Let all do what they can to assist in securing a decisive victory.
