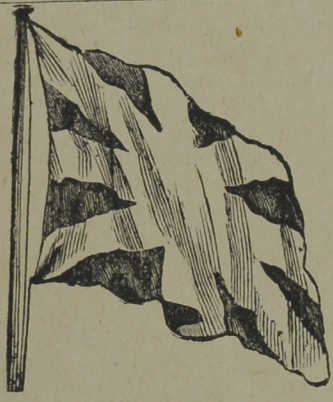

THE COMPROMISE with the drink traffic known as the "Dual Basis" of the church of England Temperance Society is being shaken up considerably of late by the London Times. We feel like supporting any society or plan that will have a tendency to reduce the sale, and amount of intoxicating liquors sold, but we are very doubtful in this country at least if the "Dual

Basis" of the Church of England Society has effected any benefit to the cause of temperance. The fact is, as an exchange very truly says, the fight with the demon of drink is too serious to be successfully engaged in with the kid gloves of moderation. No real or permanent progress can be made unless there is uncompromising hostility to intoxicating drink in every form and degree.

Human happiness, therefore, can only be complete as all the powers have their free and legitimate play. ## Province of Quebec.

Temperance has its own conflicts in Quebec Province. Grand Division members of this Province held their Thirty-seventh Annual Session at Rockburn on the 28th and 29th of Aug. There were 56 present from various parts of the Province. The G. W. P.; Thomas Barron, of Lachute, was unavoidably absent, and his report was not received by mail until after the session. The report of the G. S.; Bro. Wm. Smith, was very satisfactory. Finances show a surplus.

A few divisions have dropped out, making a decrease in the actual

membership, but in the working divisions there has been a decided increase. The Order, while not strong, is in a most healthy condition, and a little energy on the part of all its members will undoubtedly swell the ranks and further the interests of the oldest organization for temperance and prohibition in the Province.

The propagation work has been carried on with some success during the year. Two divisions with a membership of seventy-six and one Band of Hope with fifty members have been added. In order, however, to make this more effectual this year, the Grand Division urged its claims more forcibly at this session than ever before, and those who were present felt the real necessity for it. Propagation work will have to be done by every subordinate division, and every individual member before the executive can do what is expected of it.

The Grand Division resolved to distribute temperance literature among the young, and will attend to any request coming from any of the subordinate divisions. The propagation funds may very properly be applied in this manner. As to political action, the deliberations of the committee which held meetings in Montreal, on 18th April last, and the resolutions then passed were endorsed by the Grand Division, with a recommendation to the members to unite with all temperance workers to secure the return to Parliament of men pledged to advance our principles consistently with the objects of the Order.

The whole session was one calculated to do much good. It is to be regretted that several divisions were not represented, thereby being deprived of much that the grand division sessions aim at accomplishing through the representatives direct. Harmony marked the entire proceedings, and all who attended were most kindly received and entertained by the members and friends of the cause at Rockburn.
