

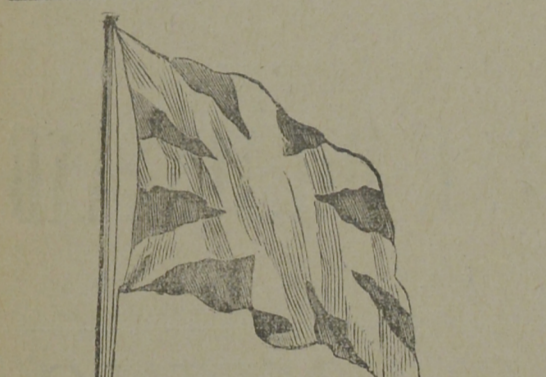
Special Notice.
