Some Facts about the Scott Act.

It would appear that those who are in favor of open rum-shops in the city of Fredericton, have succeeded in getting sufficient names to a petition that under the law, they may again test public sentiment for or against the repeal of the Scott Act. In view of the probability that the petition may result in a vote, it would be well for the citizens to quietly think over the facts as they are regarding the rum traffic and the promoters of this repeal movement.

1st. The Scott Act has been law in this city for about 12 years and during that time, notwithstanding a small increase in population, in the city proper, and a large increase in the suburbs, such as in Gibson, Marysville etc., the number of arrests for drunkenness has been very much less than in the years before the adoption of the Act.

2nd. In these years the children have been growing up comparatively safe from the temptation of the corner rum-shop, and have been educated to the fact that rum-selling is an evil and a crime, and have learned to look on the sellers of liquor as violators of the law of the country and as criminals.

3rd. That, although the Scott Act was not the legislation the temperance people had asked for, yet even with its difficulties and acknowledged imperfections they have used it to much advantage in reducing the sale of intoxicants. Many have been fined, in fact the returns financially to the city have been greater than they would have been under licenses, and others have been placed in jail, after repeated violations of the act. The public are asked to consider that ever since the act was declared law, that some who professed to be respectable citizens and who held responsible positions in the city, and others who kept the large hotels, in defiance of the expressed will of the people through the ballot box, set themselves boldly in defiance of the act, and persistently violated it and encouraged others to do likewise. While this opposition on the part of a certain class, has had the effect of reducing the efficiency of the act, yet every fair minded person cannot but acknowledge that there has never been an open display of liquors in any shop or store, and that whatever sales have been made were conducted with a certain amount of secrecy, and fear of detection on the part of the rumsellers.

4th. Investigation will show that nearly if not every one who has endeavored to sell liquor contrary to the provisions of the act, has been before the courts, fined or imprisoned, and branded as convicted criminals and rum-sellers, and that even now the slow process of the law is all that prevents at least six of the most persistent violators of the law from occupying cells in the common jail.

5th. The public will note that the agitation for a repeal of the law emanated from these same violators of it, over whom the sentence of jail is now hanging. Anxious to be legalized in a business where there are large profits, regardless of whose home is wrecked or character and life blasted, they have with the acknowledge use of money been able to gain their ends as a first step and to have sufficient signers to a petition to call for another vote on this question, at least so their advertisements set forth. Not only do these hotel keepers expect to make larger receipts through the repeal of the present law, but they anxiously stake their chances from jail on this vote. It is freely circulated, that an effort will be made to corrupt a majority of the constituency, and by large amounts of money, and free use of rum to carry the repeal.

6th. It will be noted that all the clergy and presumably all the Christian people of the community, will earnestly work and pray for the sustaining of the Scott Act. That all temperance persons, who are really interested in the suppression of this evil will vote for sustaining the act, and that all the prominent business men, and large property-holders of the city are anxious that the act shall remain in force. All those who ask for repeal are of those who wish to sell legally, or to drink without the present disgrace and difficulty, or those who are in some way controlled by the rumsellers, or expect to gain a remuneration from the traffic in some way.

In view of these facts, we ask you as one who should be anxious to promote the

prosperity of the city, and should be interested in its morality and in good order on the streets, and among the people, whether you will allow by your vote; or by your remaining from the poll, a great evil, such as a return to license, and the open sale of intoxicating liquors in this city, would be.

While you may not have any special interests at stake, or while this open sale may be no temptation to you, will you not by your vote indicate that you will not be personally responsible at least, for the open sale of liquor. It comes to be a personal and practical matter, those who vote for repeal, should it be carried, must really assume the responsibility of all the evil and crime resulting from this open sale. Those who vote against repeal, can conscientiously say, when crimes are committed and persons murdered by the drink traffic, as was seen a few months ago in this city, that we have no part or lot in it, we voted to wipe out the traffic.

Professor Bunge, Switzerland, speaking of moderate drinking, says: "The voice of conscience is smothered in drink, and whenever a hint of higher joys may be given, it is swept away in the resistless current of appetite. This pitiful loss soon makes itself manifest outwardly—the thought-like of a man is seen in his face. One has but to glance at the great army of drinkers to see how, little by little, the noble traits of countenance disappear, and only a brutal expression remains. The half of mankind is thus distorted through so-called moderate drinking."
