Prohibition Field Notes.

Melbourne, Australia, is to have a temperance hospital.

Cardinal Manning has written a letter warmly approving the Irish Sunday-closing bill.

Watermelons "stuffed" with champagne or burgundy is a late Philadelphia notion.

A recent estimate of this year's wine crop of California is placed at 20,000,000 gallons.

Baltimore has 2,800 saloons and 220 churches, and fifteen saloons for each public school.

The number of immigrant arrivals at Castle Garden, for the week ending August 10 was 5,120.

A European syndicate has purchased all the breweries of Omaha and Nebraska for \$1,500,000.

It is estimated that \$10,000 is spent for drink on an average steamship from England to Australia.

In 1888 there were 168,587 retail liquor-dealers of all kinds paying the special liquor tax in the United States.

Another State has wheeled into line for the good of its children, Florida has passed a Scientific Instruction bill, which is to take effect this fall.

Iowa paid the last dollar of her State debt recently, and her taxes are to be reduced one-fourth. This is the "ruin" wrought by prohibition.

The total importation of champagne for six months ending June 30, 1889, was 120,000 cases, about 20,000 cases more than for the same period in 1888.

Five of the six breweries in Paterson, N. J., have been bought by an English syndicate for \$2,380,000, the owners retaining a third interest in the concerns.

A Farmersburg, Ind., saloon-keeper was arrested for violation of the liquor law, and the justice who tried the case hired a hall and charged a fee for admission.

John Mullen, of Oxford, Me., is 133 years of age. He has led a wandering life and attributes his good health to his habit of wearing woollens and leaving liquor alone.

Prohibition Kansas has 100,000 more people than license Texas. Kansas has one penitentiary with 966 prisoners. Texas has two large penitentiaries with 3,000 convicts.

The Sailors Friend.

On Wednesday evening Mrs. President Steadman, W. C. T. U., presided over a delighted audience while listening to a deeply interesting address by Mrs. Trenholm, of Hantsport, N. S., Sup't. of Maritime W. C. T. U., Sailors department of work. The meeting was opened with reading of Scripture by Rev. F. D. Crawley and prayer by Rev. Job Shenton.

After a neat and appropriate address by the President, Mrs. Trenholm, who is a very pleasing speaker, disclaimed any right to be recognized as a platform speaker, or even an advocate of women's rights in the popular acceptance of the term. For about an hour she held the attention of her audience while presenting the claims of the much neglected sailor upon the hearts of the people. The work which she superintends is a new feature in the christian labors of the Union. In the speaker the sailors have a warm friend and one who is calculated to enlist sympathy in their welfare. She spoke of the good work already accomplished in many Nova Scotia ports, particularly in Hantsport and Canso, and she paid a high tribute to the worthy and noble work carried on in St. John by Miss Hutchinson, who at great personal sacrifice of her time and money has established a Sailors Rest there which has already been the means of accomplishing much good.

At the close of her well conceived and happy address, Rev. Mr. Shenton endorsed her remarks and spoke of his experience with sailors in Newfoundland and in N. S., and N. B. ports.

A choir led by Mr. Spurden rendered several selections during the evening.

The Old Plan.

Over in Charlottetown it is still the practice of the authorities to hold but one long session of school each day. The Examiner says that at a recent meeting of the School Board, the question of dividing the daily school session into two portions, with one hour between, in order to permit the pupils to return to their homes for refreshments, was discussed. The diffi-

culty in the way of such a change was found to be that as the city is not subdivided into districts for school purposes, and as all parents are permitted to send their children to the school of their choice, pupils who reside at some distance from the school at which they attend, would frequently be permitted to remain at home instead of attending at the afternoon session. The Board, however, came to the conclusion that whenever a majority of the parents express themselves desirous of such a change by petition, or some other reliable means, steps will be taken by rearranging the schools to meet the wishes of such a majority. Some time must necessarily elapse, even after such an expression of opinion in favor of a change, before the necessary arrangements could be made.
