Behring Sea Difficulty.

At Washington it is said at the treasury department that if seaman Hawkins had brought the Black Diamond into Sitka he would have received promotion, as the Black Diamond would have been confiscated and sold. As the case now stands he, acting under the orders of Captain Shepard, made a most dismal failure. Of course the treasury department will demand of Captain Shepard the most explicit explanation of his singular conduct on the occasion.

Alexander Porter Morse, a well-known authority on international law, speaking of the despatch from San Francisco wherein Congressman Felton insists in effect that the United States has the complete sovereignty and jurisdiction of Behring Sea as successor and grantee of Russia quotes Hall on international law, London, who says "the Russian government pretended to be sovereign in the Pacific north of the 51st degree of latitude. The pretension being resisted by Great Britain and the United States the area claimed was reduced to a zone of one hundred Italian miles, from the shore by an ukase of 1821, and is now wholly given up by the convention between the former powers and Russia in 1824.

Morse further stated that the assumption of the United States in claiming the exclusive jurisdiction over Behring Sea is matter that will require the most delicate diplomacy to substantiate, and he regards the position of the government in that respect as decidedly untenable.
