INTERNATIONAL LESSON.

First Quarter-Lesson II-January 13.

A SABBATH IN THE LIFE OF JESUS.-Mark 1 : 21-34.

GOLDEN TEXT.—As his custom was, he went into the synagogue on the sabbath day.-Luke 4:16.

JESUS ATTENDS CHURCH ON THE SABBATH.-Ver. 21. And they went into Capernaum : to make it their home, having been driven away from Nazareth. And straightway : the first Sabbath after Jesus came to the city. On the sabbath day, he entered into the synagogue. Synagogue means " a place of assembling together," and corresponds to "church" in our day. There were more than 450 in Jerusalem. Schools and colleges were often connected with them. No priests min istered in them. The services were more like our prayer-meetings, than like Sabbath morning services.

JESUS TEACHES WITH AUTHORITY. -Vers. 21, 22. And taught. It was common to call upon any suitable person to speak in the synagogue. And they were astonished at his doctrine. Both what he taught and the manner and spirit and authority of it. For he taught them as one that had authority. The authority of one who knows. His character, his unselfishness, his holy life, his divine deeds, gave Jesus great personal power in his teaching. The teacher will speak with authority just in so far as the truth is a part of his own being. And not as the scribes. The scribes were the learned men of the Jewish nation.

THE AUTHORITY CONFIRMED BY MIRACLE. CASTING OUT UNCLEAN SPIRITS.—Vers. 23-28. And there was in their synagogue. As part of the audience on that day. A man with an unclean spirit. Or under the influence of an unclean spirit. And he cried out. Made a sudden exclamation during the exercises. Saying, Let us alone; what have we to do with thee, thou Jesus of Nazareth? Art thou come to destroy ers? They realized that the mission of Jesus was indeed "to destroy the works of the devil." I know thee who thou art. The demon knew something of the works going on in the invisible world. The Holy One of God. Such is Christ, both morally and officially,

And Jesus rebuked him : i. e., the

devils to speak : for the same reason that he silenced the demon in the earlier part of this lesson. Because they knew him. Knew that he was the Christ, the Son of God, and were tempted to state the fact, and, perhaps, to plead with him. The Object of These Miracles. They are the natural accompaniments of a divine being. They were proofs of his divine mission. Christ came to undo the evil which Satan had done. Diseases of the body are the result of the diseases of the soul. These miracles were signs, not of power only or chiefly, but of the love, tenderness, pity, which were the true marks of the kingdom of heaven.

PRACTICAL HINTS.

The true way to keep the Sabbath is to follow Christ to church, to keep the Sabbath religiously as well as restfully.

We should have such an experience of religion that we may be able to speak to men with authority of experience and knowledge.

We can trust Christ perfectly because all he says is with the authority of one who knows all things.

All that evil men want is to be let alone, without interference in their evil works. But Christ and his church cannot let them alone. Jesus is continually casting out

evil spirits from men. It is safe to follow one who has power over the principalities and powers of evil.

Christ's wonderful deeds prove the truth of his wonderful words.

When any one chooses the service of Christ. it is a good thing for himself, his children, his wife, his parents, his servants, and all around him.

The nature of Christ and of Christianity is always to help, to save, to cure, both the body and the soul.

We have the spirit of Christ, and are true Christians, in proportion as we are helping and saving men.

Notice, in the ministry of Jesus, (1) he was active; (2) he went where people were; (3) he went where the busiest people were—those at work; (4) he went where worshipping people were; (5) he went where needy people were.

Our Intellectual Life.

The remarks of Mr. G. Mercer Adam on "The Intellectual Aspect of Political Independence" is worthy of notice He said :

and far from holiest traditions, may rise regenerated and purified, and address themselves to the task of patriotically consolidating the nation and of giving rein to its noblest intellectul and moral energies through a stable national in dependence.

A Nice Place.

One does not hear much of the Western States in these years as a paradise for set tiers. The stories that come from that ae. lectable region now are usually the reverse of pleasent. One day it is a story of dread ful disaster by a blizzard in Minnesota where the supposed-to-be-prosperous farmers have to hunt hastily for holes in the ground to escape the biting blast. Next, well-authenticated reports of wide-spread destitution in Dakota arrive. The lates attractive story is from Kansas. There are starving settlers there too. Captain E. W Jenkins, of Mead county, Kansas, a frontier agent of a Grand Army post, is reported in a telegram to the Chicago Herald as saying:

The fact is, there is a very bad state of affairs in our county. It is not to b wondered at as our corn crop was a complete failure. The real estate and loan agents are attempting to suppress the real condition of affairs, but it is a fact that unless relief is furnished there wil be great suffering. Many of the farmer are without food for themselves or their horses and they have nothing to buy with They went there two or three years ago with but very little money, and what lit tle they did have they have been robbed of by the money sharks who infest all the counties. The loan agents have mort gages on their teams, on their waggon and ploughs, on their farms, and on every thing that they own, so that it is impos sible for them to get away. We have: good county and we are going to stay there, partly because we have to, bu mainly because we believe that we can raise good crops in a favorable season Many of our farmers put in large fields o corn last season and did not get an ear They must have something to live on, but there is no work to be had for there is no money in the county. We are going through the same experience that eastern Kansas went through in 1860 and we think the time will come when our western counties will be as prosperous as the eastern part of the State. From what I learn the same state of affairs exists in all the counties of south west Kansas. There are at least severa hundred in our county who will be obliged to depend upon the generosity of the eastern half of the State. It will not be


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We are still content, almost in every line, to derive our mental culture secondhand. Our intellectual condition has not yet got rid of the marks of a colonial and provincial state. Our copyright laws are not our own; and on every side they handicap literary effort and dwarf publishing enterprises. In treaty-making we are still an infant community, and our deference to Downing Street, if not as slavish as when the country was struggling for the rights of selfgovernment, ill-accords with our present political status and lauded fiscal independence. Content to remain in this half fledged condition, it is no surprise to find that there has been little blending into one national type all the provincial currents of Canadian thought, and that we are far as yet from securing a distinctly national school of literature. The term nation, indeed, is still strange in the mouth of our public men, and Canadian nationality, instead of being a real and constructive force, is yet only a furtive aspiration. Among French Canadians, where the term is used, it has a restricted, and, to their Englishspeaking brethren, an alien meaning. It may be, however, that the day will soon come-perhaps in war, or through the ferment of a great political upheaval -when the untoward influences we have referred to shall pass away, and when sectional hostility, racial jealousy and religious cleavage shall give place to national unification, patriotic aspiration and the consolidating forces of an ardent national sentiment. That the day may come quickly must be the desire of every patrict heart. With this desire must be the further one, that Canadian political parties, which have long survived their slender stock of principles, and been living on their past
